Toronto, Jan. 18—11 p.m.—The high
pressure in Eastern Canada has been re-
placed by the depression in the upper lake
district yesterday which is now central
near Anticosti Island. Mild weather pre-
vails from the lakes to the Atlantic, and
light rain or sleet has fallen in Ontario and
Western Quebec. In the Northwest moder-
ately cold, fair weather prevails.

—Mr. R. J. Munro, G. T. R. car dis-
tributor, has gone on a trip to the Western

—The Roman Catholic clergy of the Lon-
don diocese will hold a regular conference
here on Jan. 31.

—Mr. Edson Westman, has been ap-
pointed organist of the Askin Street
Methodist Church. Mr. Westman is a

—The entrance for guests to the Hunt
ball to-night in the Opera House will be

—An Ottawa dispatch says in addition to

were Mrs. Baskerville, Ald. Charles Taylor,
ex-Ald. Stevely and Mr. James Crawford.
The lecturer, dressed in the robes of
priesthood, and the audience appeared to
heartily endorse all that was said.

—The Alert Baseball Club is an enter-
prising and clever organization and de-
serves support in anything it undertakes.
In order to raise funds for next season the
club will give a novel entertainment in
Victoria Hall next Tuesday evening. The
performance will be the Ideal Banjo Club
of Toronto, and the noted humorous vocalist
and character impersonator, Harry M.
Bennett. The concert will be an excellent
one, and the friends of the Alerts will
doubtless patronize it in large numbers.

—It is definitely settled that William H.
Crane, formerly with the Holmans, will
appear as Falstaff in "The Merry Wives of
 Windsor" next season. Preparations for
the event are well under way, and Richard
Barker, the English stage manager, has
been engaged to direct the rehearsal. Mr.
Crane will use the original edition of the
comedy, prepared by himself after a good
deal of study and comparison of the prompt-
books of the great Falstaffs of the English
and American stage. The production will
be an elaborate one.

J. J. Ross, manager of the Erie and
Huron Railway, and Messrs. C. W. Childs,
of Detroit, and T. G. Davey and W.
Morden, of London, supposed to be the
possessors of a unique machine, came to
Wednesday on a Huron and Erie special.
They made no breaks to newspaper men,
but their business is said to have been in
connection with the procuring of a large
craft to carry coal for the road from Cleve-

—The world's committee of the Young

London; Pastor George Appia, Paris; Pastor
Krumacher, Germany; Rev. F. B. Meyer,
D.D., London; and Richard C. Morse and
James Stokes, New York.

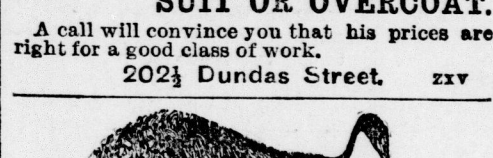

John R. Hooper Case.

JOLIETTE, Que., Jan. 18.—Mr. J. N.
Greenshields, Q.C., addressed the jury on
behalf of John Reginald Hooper this morn-
ing. He began by saying: "Gentlemen of the
jury.—The charge against the prisoner is
murder, and if you find him guilty it will
be the duty of the judge to sentence him to
death." He dealt with the danger of cir-
cumstantial evidence, and related cases
where it had been the means of convicting
innocent people. The crown, he said, had
made much of the Louisville part of the
case, which had no connection at all with
the crime as charged in the indictment.
Coming to the alleged object of the crime,
he said the prisoner had never spoken of
love to Miss Stapley until after his wife's
death.

Mr. MacMaster delivered his address for
the Crown this afternoon, and was followed
by Mr. C. A. Cornalliet. The judge will
deliver his charge to-morrow. It is ex-
pected the case will be finished by to-
morrow evening.
