DEFENSE COMPLETES MEDICAL TESTIMONY!

"I Think That He Gave Too Good a Story," Was Toronto Expert's Opinion of Herbert's Evidence.

Crown Wrings Admission From Opposing Witness Who Has Examined the Barn That There May Have Been Foul Play--Lay Witnesses on the Stand Today.

After seven days of wearisome dragging the Sifton murder trial is gradually nearing its close. Few will be sorry when the last scene has ended, save the morbid-minded members of the public, who find in a fellow-being's struggle for life a matter of curiosity and an opportunity to kill a few hours.

Judge, lawyers, court officials, press men, all are thoroughly weary of the trial; while as for the unhappy man in the dock, no one but himself can realize how ardently he longs for the moment when his fate will be determined and his suspense ended.

The defense yesterday put in the last of its medical evidence, and today there remains the lay evidence to be entered. The opinion is freely expressed that the whole of the medical testimony on both sides might have been discarded without seriously affecting the outcome of the case.

While no one doubts the good faith and sincerity of the medical men in the expression of their respective opinions, yet the unanimity with which the crown's doctors swore to one set of statements, and the unanimity and alacrity with which the defense's medical men advanced diametrically opposed opinions cannot fail to shake the faith of the public in the value of expert evidence as a whole.

to Miss Stone: "We want you," and ordered her and Miss Stone to go with them. She made no remonstrance. Mr. Tsilka made a move to follow his wife, but they forced him back. QUESTION OF IMMIGRATION. Melbourne, Oct. 2.—The House of Representatives today adopted a clause of the Immigration bill prohibiting the entry into the Dominion of any one under contract to do manual labor.

London, Oct. 2.—The Daily News commenting on the present royal visit to the Dominion, says: "What is to be the future? Canada is one of the biggest questions that face the British empire today. Unhappily, English immigration, never very large, has very much declined in the last few years. Canada has even lost in population the number of British subjects recruited officers for the South African constabulary to draw from the homes of Canada's precious settlers in the Northwest."

TURKEY'S SITUATION. London, Oct. 2.—The Times publishes the following dispatch from its Constantinople correspondent: "The reports received at all the embassies and legations here from consuls in the provinces depict a situation everywhere so deplorable that an ambassadorial conference and collective action are contemplated."

It is reported that an agreement has been arrived at by which Britain and Turkey will in the future act together to preserve the peace
