DEFENSE COMPLETES MEDICAL TESTIMONY!

"I Think That He Gave Too Good a Story," Was Toronto Expert's Opinion of Herbert's Evidence.

Crown Wins Admission From Opposing Witness Who Has Examined the Barn That There May Have Been Foul Play—Lay Witnesses on the Stand Today.

After seven days of wearisome dragging the Sifton murder trial is gradually nearing its close. Few will be sorry when the last scene has ended, save the morbid-minded members of the public, who find in a fellow-being's struggle for life a matter of curiosity and an opportunity to kill a few hours. Judge, lawyers, court officials, press men, all are thoroughly weary of the trial; while as for the unhappy man in the dock, no one but himself can realize how ardently he longs for the moment when his fate will be determined and his suspense ended.

The defense yesterday put in the last of its medical evidence, and today there remains the lay evidence to be entered. The opinion is freely expressed that the whole of the medical testimony on both sides might have been discarded without seriously affecting the outcome of the case. While no one doubts the good faith and sincerity of the medical men in the expression of their respective opinions, yet the unanimity with which the crown's doctors swore to one set of statements, and the unanimity and alacrity with which the defense's medical men advanced diametrically opposed opinions cannot fail to shake the faith of the public in the value of expert evidence as a whole.

Tuesday Afternoon.

DR. JAMES SUTTON.
Dr. James Sutton, of Clarendon, took the stand after Dr. Angus Graham. Dr. Sutton's evidence was corroborative of that of the preceding witnesses. If Herbert's evidence was

true, he thought the skull would have been smashed.

DR. P. L. GRAHAM.
Dr. P. L. Graham, of Lobo village, swore that he was at the Sifton house on Saturday last, and examined the body in the barn. Witness said his own height was about six feet. Standing on the lowest step of the ladder his chin was level with the floor of the barn. On the second step his breast was level with the floor. Witness weighs about 165 pounds, about six feet high, and is therefore similar in build to Joseph Sifton. There was a casing about ten inches deep around the trap hole. Witness stood on the ladder and tried to adjust his head so as to touch the mastoid bone to the corner of the trap, but was unable to do so.

This is the manner in which the crown seeks to prove that the abrasions behind the ears of Joseph Sifton were created.

Witness could not reconcile Herbert's story with the condition of the skull. Witness thought the injuries quite consistent with a fall. If Herbert's story were true, witness would expect to find hay and chaff in the hair.

A STARTLING QUESTION.
Mr. Johnston's cross-examination finished. Mr. Riddell arose and asked abruptly:

"And you came to the conclusion that there had been foul play?"

"No, I didn't do that," said the witness.

"After you examined the place on Saturday, did you come to the conclusion there had been foul play?" repeated Mr. Riddell.

"I couldn't come to any conclusion whether there was or not."

"Did you say to anyone that you knew there had been foul play?"

"In talking with some one, I believe I did say it looked as if."

THERE WAS FOUL PLAY.
"After you examined that place on Saturday, didn't you?"

"I DON'T REMEMBER."
was the witness' answer.

"I am informed," continued counsel "that after examining that place on Saturday you said you hadn't the slightest doubt but that there was foul play."

"I don't think I said that. I said I thought it was foul play, but the man could never have been killed in the way it was described."

Mr. Riddell asked that, if Sifton, when first struck, fell to the south-west corner, would that not abrade the right mastoid. Then, if the body was caught by the coat collar and pulled to the opposite corner, would that not abrade the left side? Witness thought it almost impossible.

THE JUDGE PROTESTS.
"Is this going to be the same thing over and over?" asked his lordship, as Mr. Johnston called for another medical man.

"No, my lord," said Mr. Johnston. "I have only three or four more medical men. Under the circumstances, I would not like to curtail my medical evidence."

His lordship said he did not wish to curtail Mr. Johnston's evidence, but there should be a stop somewhere.

DR. JOHN GUNN.
The evidence of Dr. John Gunn, of Alisa Craig, was a repetition of that of his predecessors. Herbert's story did not agree with the condition of the skull, and the injuries were consistent with a fall. Dr. J. McWilliams, of Thamesford, who followed, gave the same evidence. Both witnesses admitted to Mr. Riddell that their reason for disbelieving Herbert's story was the force of blows as described by him.

DR. H. A. STEVENSON.
Dr. H. A. Stevenson, of London, next ascended the stand. He had been present at the post-mortem on behalf of the defense. Witness considered that if Herbert's story were true, the

PLAGUE SPREADS!

Thousands of New Cases Reported in British East India and Egypt—Many Deaths.

Reports to the United States hospital service from all parts of the world show a continued spread of the plague in most sections. In British East India during the week ended Aug. 2 last, there were 2,622 new plague cases, and 1,390 deaths recorded in the Bombay presidency, an increase of more than 200 deaths over the previous week. There were 136 plague deaths in the

city of Bombay that week, and many others suspected.

In Egypt the total number of bubonic plague cases from April 7 to Sept. 2, was 132 with 60 deaths. In Queensland the destruction of rats continues, but the official report shows 32 plague cases including ten deaths from Feb. 28 to July 6.

In China at the port and town of Swatow and neighboring districts the plague is steadily decreasing.

SAILBOAT CAPSIZED!

Three Lives Lost in Attempt to Save a Dog.

Death of Daniel Handley, M. C. R. Brakeman—Man Roasted to Death in a Barn.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Oct. 1.—By the capsizing of a sail boat on West Lake, seven miles south of Kalamazoo, three people lost their lives, Sunday afternoon. They were Isaac Vanhaist, age 36; Mrs. Peter Kromdike, age 39, and Miss Edith Waud, age 13, all of Kalamazoo. Four other persons in the boat escaped. The accident was caused in a peculiar manner. Miss Edith Waud had a dog, which jumped overboard. In turning the boat to save the dog, the craft capsized, and the whole party was thrown into the water, six feet deep. Isaac Vanhaist was a fine swimmer, and lost his life while saving others of the party.

M. C. R. BRAKEMAN KILLED.
St. Thomas, Ont., Oct. 2.—Dan Handley, brakeman on the St. Clair branch local, met with a fatal accident at Inwood yesterday morning.

After opening a switch, Handley attempted to jump on the pilot of the locomotive. He slipped and fell between the wheels, one leg being severed from the body below the knee, and the other frightfully mangled. He was also cut about the head, and his back severely lacerated. The injured man was conveyed to the hospital here, where he died at 5:30 last evening. Dan was one of the best ball players this city ever produced. He was the star pitcher for the old St.

Thomas Browns, and pitched for the team in the semi-professional league. Afterwards he played short on the independent professional St. Thomas team in 1897. Mr. Handley married the daughter of James Munn, one of the oldest merchants in this city, three years ago.

ROASTED IN A BARN.
Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 2.—By the explosion of a boiler used in threshing a farm in Fleming yesterday morning, Charles White was instantly killed and his remains were roasted in the barn, which instantly took fire. A laborer assisting him was so badly hurt that he may die.

DROWNED IN CANAL.
Perth, Oct. 1.—A boy, 8 years of age, eldest son of A. Gibson, of this town, was found drowned in the Tay Canal last night. It is supposed that he fell into the water accidentally.

RAFT UPSET.
Amsterdam, N. Y., Oct. 2.—Edward Schneck, brother of former State Engineer Martin Schneck, and George Lambert were drowned at Fort Hunter yesterday afternoon by the overturning of a raft from which they were unloading stone at the state dam.

DROPPED DEAD!
Good News Was Too Much for Samuel B. Fell, of Windsor.

Windsor, Oct. 2.—Samuel B. Fell, aged 39, of 561 Sixteenth street, collector for the American Wringer Company, dropped dead Monday afternoon in the corridor of the Douglas block.

Windsor, Oct. 2.—He leaves a wife and four brothers. Deceased had been informed at the ferry landing by a man named Lewis that he had \$10,000 to put into the furniture business at Marquette, Mich., a project they had been considering.
