The total loss at the two places is supposed to have been in the neighborhood of \$150,000. The damage to the warehouse of Tanton & Son was several thousand dollars, but the bulk of the loss occasioned by the fire was on the goods of persons stored there.

OLD PEOPLE DIED.

The registrations with the city clerk during the month of June totaled 178. Of these sixty-five were births and forty-three deaths, showing a gain in the population of twenty-two. Marriages were the most numerous, the month of roses having seventy to its credit. The deaths during the month included many old persons. Three were over 50 and under 60, three were over 60, six were over 70 and under 80, five were over 80 and under 90, and one had reached the age of 95. The average age of the seventeen persons over 50 was near 72 years.

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Queen's Park, yesterday afternoon and evening, was the scene of gatherings the like of which have not been witnessed in London for many years.

It is now close upon two decades since the Caledonian games were held in London, and it was with the object of reviving the old-time enthusiasm throughout the district that the St. Andrew's Society this year decided on the games which were held so successfully on the national holiday. In the olden days the city boasted of its Scottish organizations and their success in carrying out every undertaking. It was not an unusual thing, it is said, to see from 12,000 to 18,000 spectators gathered at the old exhibition grounds to witness the games. They would come from every part of the west, while the pipers, dancers and

Of the athletes, there was but one of the veteran class. He was Charles J. Currie, of Parkhill, who, with his brother, the late R. Dan McLeod, the champion wrestler of Hamilton, was another of the well-known men of muscle on the grounds.

Jailer Nichol headed a deputation from Stratford, Dutton and its representatives, and even the Caledonian society of Detroit was not without its delegation, including Messrs. Robert Rankin, Watson, Dr. McKenzie and John Fairgrieve, the latter an old resident of London, who for many years was a leading figure in every Scottish undertaking. Right and left the day long, Mr. Fairgrieve was given the glad news, and he finally concluded, with the conclusion that it was the "brawliest day" he had ever spent.

CADETS OPEN PROGRAMME.

The St. Andrew's Highland Cadets, 69 strong, under Capt. Munro, were present during the day, and opened the programme with a royal salute, after which the band played the National Anthem. The band that attracted the most attention naturally was the organization led by Mr. Roscoe Pococke, every member being attired in plaid trousers, cream serge and gleaming caps. The Seventh Band was also in attendance and throughout the day it rendered selections, Scottish and otherwise.

THE ATHLETIC EVENTS.

The athletic events included weight and shot-putting contests, jumping and racing, and the prizes were well distributed. Currie only succeeded in taking one first prize. That he was not in condition was evident by his work in putting the 14-pound shot. His distance was under 39 feet, whereas his record mark was 51 feet 5 inches.

Bush, a Rochester sprinter, found it easy to land the first money in the events which he entered. He sprained his ankle in one of the short runs, and could not compete in the mile, open.

George Stewart, of the Forty-eighth Highlanders, Toronto, the world's champion with the sword and bayonet, was also a prominent figure in the contests.
