Special dispatches say the Russians at Vafangow had 42 battalions against 44 Japanese battalions. The Japanese had great superiority in artillery, having more than two hundred guns. TO HEAD OFF KUROKI.

Gen. Kuroki's Headquarters in the Field, via Fu San, June 17. - Delayed in Transmission, - Gen. Kuroki quietly awaiting the results of fighting on the Liao Tung Peninsula, on the result of which, according to a high officer, the future movements of the first Japanese army largely depends. The Russian reoccupation of the town northwest of the Japanese front is believed to indicate a plan to prevent Gen, Kuroki from attempting a junction with the Japanese forces on the Liao Tung Peninsula.

Correspondents with Gen, Kuroki's army have been promised greater liberty and have been given permission to visit the outposts of the army. Heavy rains prevail.

# DIVER MAKES GHASTLY FIND

Discovers Hole in River Bed Packed With Slocum Dead.

## LACK HEARSES FOR FUNERALS

So Great Is the Demand That Neighboring Citles Have Been Drawn Upon for Burial Carriages.

New York, June 18 .- A diver who today renewed the search for victims of the steamer General Slocum disaster found a deep hole in the bed of the river practically filled with bodies. Within an hour after the search was hegun eight bodies had been brought tween 30 and 50 bodies still remained in the hole. The diver was searching along the river bottom when he found several bodies lying together. At first there appeared to be about half a dozen bodies in the pile, but upon investigation the diver found a great hole in the river bed literally packed with dead. He says at least 30 more bodies will be found when the tide turns and permits a resumption of work. This number, he says, may be greatly exceeded. After the lapse of three days since the disaster the most carefully collected data shows that 568

bodies have been recovered up to this So far as could be learned plans had been made for the burial of 111 bodies from homes in the vicinity of St. Mark's Church. The plans included services in 37 churches, of all denominations in that neighborhood.

Considerable difficulty had been experienced by undertakers in securing a sufficient number of hearses, and it became necessary to call upon the neighboring cities in order to supply the demand. In accordance with a German custom the people who were obliged to be out of doors passed through the streets of the stricken parish with bared heads. Business was ractically suspended and stores were draped in black, and lines of hearses filled the streets. The funerals began at an early hour and at times the streets were completely blocked and traffic of other kinds was impossible o its canacity. Clergymen parts of the greater city had left their own congregations and come to the bereaved district to give spiritual con-
