THE MARLBOROS DID NOT LOSE CHAMP GAME IN TWO SEASONS

Remarkable Record Made by the Winners of the O. H. A. Seniors.

The Marlboros have the proud record of winning the O. H. A. championship twice in succession, capturing the highest honors both years they have played senior hockey. This year's team was not defeated this season in a championship contest—a most remarkable record, and a duplicate of last year's performance.

FIGHTS FOR STANLEY CUP.

The defense of the Stanley cup by the Ottawa Hockey Club against Rat Portage in the series at Ottawa will be the seventh for the Capital Seven. Dawson City this season furnished the sixth set of challengers that was forced to bow down before the Ottawa team since they came into possession of the trophy on March 10, 1903.

In view of the fact that in defense of the trophy Ottawa has had to do battle with six different teams, each the champion of its respective league, and that in the twelve games played only once has the Capital Seven met an unopposed defeat, their record is indeed a proud one, and easily eclipses that of any other club which has so far had to defend the trophy.

The total goals scored in each series is as follows: Ottawa 10, Rat Portage 11; Ottawa 15, Cornwall 17; Marlboros 5; Ottawa 5, Wanderers 5; Ottawa 15, Brandon 6; Ottawa 32, Dawson 4; Ottawa total 92; challengers' total 119.

Thus in the twelve games which have been played in its defense since winning the trophy, Ottawa has won 11 and lost 1. The overwhelming total of 92 goals have been scored against its opponents, while the team has been scored on but 31 times.

Lajoie's record was "Cap" Anson, who had a grand average of .356 for fifteen years. Lajoie has a batting average of .349 for eight years, and in no single year has he ever had a batting average equal to Lajoie's average of .363 for five years.

Lajoie is a free-hand hitter, impatient while at bat and willing to hit anything within reach. He can pick a ball off his shoe from over his head, and he can smash it out for two bases.

Not only that, but often with men on bases and the opposing pitcher throwing the ball wide in an effort to allow Lajoie to take his base on balls, the big fellow will reach out and smash the ball to the right field fence for two or three bases, driving everyone else on the bases over the rubber and winning the game.

His record shows that he has been hit 4,025 times and has made 1,461 basehits, which gives him a grand average of .363 for nine years' work in the major leagues.

SCORE 7 TO 4 AGAINST BERLIN WON THE LEAGUE A SECOND TIME

Victoria Harbor Wins First of Games for Intermediate Honors. Victoria Harbor, Ont., March 8.—Victoria Harbor tonight won the first game against Berlin in the O. H. A. intermediate final by a score of 7 to 4 in one of the fastest games seen here. In the first half Victoria Harbor scored three goals before Berlin woke up, and the score at half-time was 4 to 1. The game was very close in the second half, with teams checking close and hard. The game was clean and free from rough playing, only one man being ruled off. Referee Hankin kept the players well in hand and gave every satisfaction.

The home team won the victors on their return home and escorted them to Charbonneau's restaurant, where a fine spread was laid out in their honor.

Montreal, March 8.—Montreal defeated Westmont in the final match of the C. A. H. L. series tonight by a score of 5 to 3.

Gravenhurst, Ont., March 8.—By far the biggest crowd of the season filled the rink tonight to see the second round with Bracebridge for the Excelsior cup. The home team won by a score of 6 to 5, but lost the round by one goal.

Wednesday evening the Diamond Hall hockey team defeated a picked team of drygoods men by a score of 7 to 2. The Diamond Hall team has not been defeated this season.

Close Race in the A. O. F. Carpetball League—One Game to Play. The A. O. F. Carpetball League has about completed its schedule, only one game remaining to be played. With three of the teams, the race has been very close. Court Magnolia, with all games played, has won nine and lost three.
