SOUTH AMERICA MAY HAVE MIX-UP

Peru, Bolivia, Chili and Brazil Fall Out Over Territorial Matters.

Washington, D. C., April 26. — The whole of South America is in a turmoil over two serious territorial questions, and the good offices of the President of the United States are being sought to maintain peace.

The old dispute between Peru and Chile regarding the provinces of Tacna and Arica, which Chile now holds as a result of the war with Peru almost a quarter of a century ago, has assumed a serious phase as a result of a treaty just signed by Chile and Bolivia whereby the latter has recognized Chilean ownership of Peru's lost provinces, and against which the Peruvian Government had made a vigorous protest.

The Acre dispute between Brazil and Bolivia, which was "settled" a year and a half ago, will not down. From it has arisen another controversy—that between Brazil and Peru, as to the ownership of the two hundred thousand square miles of rich territory comprised in the Acre region.

These two questions have in them the germ of an international war in South America, and have given rise to as pretty a bit of diplomatic sparring in Washington for the support of the United States as has ever occurred here. Brazil has deemed the dispute with Peru of sufficient importance as to warrant the appointment of an ambassador to the United States instead of a minister, a rank heretofore held by its representative in Chile, is presenting the United States for the designation of a minister with whom she can treat. There is today only one charge d'affaires in Santiago, Peru is keenly regretting the departure of Irving B. Dudley, the United States minister accredited to that Government, who probably will be transferred to Venezuela, because Peru found in him a sympathetic advocate of her cause.

Washington, therefore, has become the vortex of the whirlpool of pan-American politics. Peru practically is friendly. Her only sympathizer in the whole of South America is Argentina, but Argentina's interest is placid now that her disputes with Chile are at an end. Brazil has the support of Chile in her pretensions to the Acre territory, and the sympathy of Bolivia, which has relinquished all rights to this region. Chile has the support of Brazil in her claims to the provinces of Tacna and Arica, and Bolivia, by the treaty recently signed with Chile, has recognized the permanency of Chilean occupation of those provinces. It looks as if Peru will have to surrender to the inevitable and surrender at once, unless the United States intervenes.

RAIDING THE PINES

Sapsuckers Return Early and Get Busy at Victoria Park.

Mr. W. E. Saunders writes as follows: The Sapsucker (Sphyrapicus varius) is the smallest of our woodpeckers except the Downy. It migrates to the south in fall and on the return journey arrives at London about April 14. This year the first birds seen here were reaching here April 2, but the birds did not become common for a week or two afterwards, and they are still here in fair numbers. Last Sunday, passing through Victoria Park I noticed a couple of these birds, and in the afternoon went over and visited their favorite trees, the Scotch pine, of which there are four or five specimens in the park, three of these we found Sapsuckers, and as far as we were able to see they were working at their usual trade of making holes in the trees. The trunks of these pines are thickly punctured with holes about three-quarters of an inch deep and a quarter inch wide at the entrance. In some places the holes are only an inch apart and they are usually made in rings around the trees, the distance between the rings varying from six inches or two up to a couple of feet. The birds are supposed to make these holes in order that they may drink the sap which flows from the sap holes, but they probably catch insects and the sap as well, but what has always puzzled me with regard to their evident fondness for the Scotch pine is the sap does not readily flow from it, but on the contrary the holes fill with resinous exudate of which it is very doubtful if any use is made. Other trees are frequently tapped by the bird. I saw one on Sunday afternoon standing with evident relish on a maple tree, and they have been known to perforate an apple tree so completely that its vitality was impaired, although I can see no evidence of damage on the pines in the park. The Austrian pine is closely allied to the Scotch pine, but the holes are doubtless a different flavor, as the birds have left the specimens of this tree that are in the park without any harm, and they have been known to make many holes in any other kind of tree except the Scotch pine, but every specimen of the Austrian pine has had rings after rings made around its trunk. When I have watched the birds at work they have always been engaged in making holes, and I have never seen them make any use whatever of those already made.

RUSS LOSSES AT MUKDEN

Official Statement Say Only 87,677 Prisoners and 30,000 Casualties.

Gunsu Pass, Manchuria, April 26.—An exact statement of the losses in the battle of Mukden from Feb. 19 to March 14, compiled by the general staff, shows that the casualties were greatly overestimated in earlier reports. Statements from Japanese sources including wholesale captures of prisoners, enormous booty and cannon are now denied.

In reality there were two Russian generals who were taken prisoners, 1,958 staff and other officers, and 87,677 men, of whom the greatest part, about 25,000, were wounded. In evacuating Mukden and retreating to the northward the Russians lost 32 guns, of which three were mortars, three old 150-mm. guns and one 120-mm. gun. Of 26 quick-firing guns, of the siege artillery every gun and all the ammunition cars were sent north two days before the retreat began.

General Kurkevitch, the chief of staff, calculates that other losses, aside from wounded, were as follows: 15,000 killed, 7,000 known to have been captured, and 10,000 to 12,000 missing, of whom several thousand were drivers, sanitary and commissariat companies and other non-combatants. A very large number were slightly wounded and returned to the ranks, many even resorting to deception in order to leave the hospitals.

This indicates that the extent of the Japanese victory and the disaster of the Russian retreat have been greatly exaggerated and shows that the spirit of the Russian army is still strong and the troops not demoralized.
