CHANDLER AT AUDITORIUM

New York Lawyer Addresses Men's Meeting on Trial of Jesus.

Hon. Walter M. Chandler, a prominent member of the New York bar, addressed a crowded audience at the men's meeting in the Auditorium on Sunday afternoon on the subject, "The Trial of Jesus from a Lawyer's Standpoint." The subject was handled in masterly style by a man who is an orator in the first degree. In his denunciation of the Jewish race, which for spiritual and intellectual had never been surpassed by any nation. Current ideas of the Jewish race were false. As a race, they were not great financiers and merchants, although a few men, such as Rothschild, had been produced. A race which produced such men as Heine, Galilee, Moosman, was one that could show intellectual. The speaker denounced race prejudice against any man or any race. One-third of the German University professors were Jews, as were most of the newspaper editors of Europe.

Coming more directly to the trial, Mr. Chandler devoted some time to a review of the Jewish law regarding trials, and then proceeded to discuss a number of the points on which the trial was illegal. In all legal cases two things must be considered—the law and the facts. The first miscarriage of justice was in conducting the trial at night, contrary to Jewish law, at a time when the Sanhedrin could have no possible jurisdiction. As the trial was conducted at an illegal time, the decision of the court must necessarily be illegal. Again the trial took place on the eve of the Passover, also illegal. This was a further violation of Jewish ecclesiastical law. A fourth error was in the fact that the prisoner was made to accuse himself by the answers to the questions of the high priest, who was both accuser and judge. Finally, while blasphemy was the charge brought by the Jews, the sentence pronounced was the Roman punishment for high treason. Nowhere in the Jewish law could crucifixion be found as a punishment. Thus Jesus was tried by Jewish law and given a Roman punishment.

In conclusion, the speaker said that every man, sooner or later, must answer two great questions, one propounded by Job: "If a man die, shall he live again?" and the great question of Pilate: "What shall I do with Jesus, which is called the Christ?"

G. T. R. ELECTRIC POWER HOUSE.

This week the Grand Trunk Railway engineers will arrive in Port Huron and stake out the ground for the power house to be used in furnishing electric power for the tunnel. The Times understands that the building will be erected on the company's property on the east side of Military street, below the railroad bridge. It will have a frontage of nearly 200 feet and will extend back toward the river 300 feet. All of the cables leading to the tunnel will run down the shaft which was sunk over the property when the tunnel was constructed. The work of building the machinery has been begun by the Westinghouse Company, and will be ready as soon as the necessary building is erected.

ST. PAUL'S ANNIVERSARY.

The 73rd anniversary of the parish of St. Paul's Cathedral and the 71st of the church will be celebrated during the week. The special services began yesterday in the cathedral, when Rev. Canon Farthing, M. A., of Woodstock, gave two splendid sermons appropriate to the occasion. In the

morning Canon Farthing briefly reviewed the condition of the Anglican Church during past ages, and he earnestly advocated the upholding of the faith which had been handed down to the present from the churches of the past. The English Church was the custodian of that faith which was declined through the Scriptures. She had held it in the past, and today he felt it truly, and presented it as faithfully as in any period of the past. In the evening Canon Farthing spoke on "The Last Supper." At 10:30 o'clock this morning the anniversary of King Edward's accession to the throne in 1901 will be celebrated by a special service. Rev. John Mockridge, rector of St. Andrew's, Detroit, will address the Wednesday evening prayer meeting. The celebration of Holy Communion will take place Thursday morning, and special services will mark the closing day of the week of celebration on next Sunday.

RIVER COMES UP WITH A RUSH BREAKWATER GETS FIRST TEST

Wall Stands Strain—A Slight Damage at Cove—Seven Feet of Water at Dam.

With a rise in the river of about six feet, the breakwater is being put to a severe test. The water is now running practically free from ice. The water at noon was even with the grounds of the sulphur baths, and was making its way into the bathhouse of the London Rowing Club. Just south of Blackfriars bridge, the water within four feet of the top of the breakwater, and this appeared to be the most dangerous spot in the wall.

Mr. F. A. Jones, of West London, stated to The Advertiser, however, that in his opinion the most dangerous place was in the wall along Dundas street, about 200 yards west of the bridge. Nevertheless, the wall at this point appeared to be safe, and the water was not assuming a dangerous level.

Engineer Simmle, of the waterworks, stated this morning that 6 feet 9 inches of water was going over the dam, but no trouble was looked for. The Springfield cars were running as usual this morning, though it was reported that the water was flowing across the Pipe Line road.

For the first time in their history, West Londoners look with equanimity on the rising river. Thanks to the new wall, they may now go to sleep without fearing a flood, and they do not hesitate to give ex-Mayor Campbell credit for the money he caused to be spent on the breakwater last year, even at the expense of an overdraft.

LONDON CHICKS WIN

Carry Off Big Honors at the Boston Poultry Show.

Boston, Jan. 22.—The tenth annual exhibition of the Boston Poultry Association opened here with an increase of nearly 1,000 entries over the show of 1905. A very large share of the additional entries is due to the heavy entries made by Canadian exhibitors, there being close to 700 birds from London, Stratford, Toronto and Cornwall.

In White and Black Cochins, W. G. Murray, Stratford, in the largest class of these varieties ever shown in America, wins the \$100 challenge cup for best White Cochin male, whilst in black he wins most of the best prizes. In Javas, Hamburgs, Polands, Ornamental Bantams, McNeill & Oke, London, win nearly 75 per cent of the principal prizes, whilst they capture the \$100 challenge cup for the best Cochin bantam.

Together the Canadians are quite jubilant over their success at this, the chief annual fixture among American poultry exhibitors.

MEN TO GIVE RECEPTION

Catholics of City Will Welcome Home Bishop and Father Aylward.

A meeting of the men of the congregations of St. Peter's Cathedral and St. Mary's Church was held in the Sacred Heart schoolhouse on Sunday afternoon, at which committees were appointed to make arrangements for a grand reception to his Lordship Bishop McEvay and Rev. Father Aylward, rector of St. Peter's, on their return from Rome.

It is the intention to surprise the bishop in a very acceptable manner. Tonight the men of St. Mary's congregation meet in St. Mary's Hall to perfect arrangements for a canvass of the parish.

SURGEON AMPUTATES RINGS

Sweetheart Had First Pried Diamond Out of Its Setting.

New York, Jan. 21.—Instead of an operation that might cost her a finger, all that a pretty girl suffered in Gouverneur Hospital was the amputation of two rings. The unusual case came up in the Essex Market court, where Mrs. Yetta Friedman, of 398 Thurston street, was held in \$1,000 bail by Magistrate Wahl for examination.

The girl, Sophie Diamond, 19 years old, of 78 Bank street, New London, arrived here a few days ago in answer to a letter from her sweetheart, Joseph Peckler. She was taken to the home of Mrs. Friedman, in Rivington street, where Peckler lived. On her finger she wore a handsome diamond ring valued at \$150. Peckler, when in the room with her, told her the ring, but the girl refused. It is alleged by the girl that Peckler then seized her, threw her on the bed, and Mrs. Friedman holding her, he tried the stone out of the setting with a knife.

The girl's screams attracted other tenants in the house, but the door had been locked. The girl was taken to the hospital, where she was found unconscious on the floor. The girl's mother, Mrs. Friedman, was told the story and the girl's mother, Peckler had disappeared.

Ning district were quickly suppressed. As it was stated by one of the censors that Kwang Zi matters and the prefect of Lien Chau were sent from Pekin to the viceroy, were not quite settled, however, orders Chang Chi Tung, to investigate and report, and confidence is placed in this official. There are small bodies of marauders roaming about in the two Kwan provinces, but they are not formidable, and their center is known to be at Yu Ling Chau. As to the story of another Boxer uprising being imminent, it seems to have originated in a report from Yun-nan, in the extreme southwest of China, to the effect that the Buddhist monks were inclined to be demonstrative, and it was feared by some that this might lead to an anti-Christian uprising. The Peking Government was able to give assurances that no such danger existed.

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
