THREW THE LAMP AT A DETECTIVE

Glass Broke and Cut Officer.
Who, However, Kept On
Up the Stairs.

Toronto, Aug. 18.—Detective Alex. Montgomery had five stitches put in a badly lacerated head in St. Michael's Hospital yesterday afternoon as the result of an encounter with a negro.

The negro's name is Sam Garrison, and the detective went into 10 Alice street to place him under arrest. Garrison saw him coming, and as he mounted the steps a lamp was hurled at the detective's head. He put up his right hand to protect himself, and when the lamp hit, it broke in a hundred pieces.

Montgomery kept right ahead, and soon he and Garrison were having a beautiful mix-up. It resulted with the handcuffs on Garrison, who looked more like a redman than a black one from the blood from the injured head.

After the prisoner was securely locked up, Montgomery went to the hospital, where Dr. Parker dressed the wounds.

The original charge against Garrison is one of theft. The police state that he enticed Joseph Stark into a cheap lodging house, and when Stark awoke this morning \$19 was gone.

Garrison is well known to the police and has appeared in court several times.

ROUGH WORK AGAIN AT GLACE BAY MINES

A Special Constable Attacked by Three
Men and Badly Beaten.

Glace Bay, N. S., Aug. 18.—Assaults on miners who are working appear to be breaking out here again. Several affairs of this kind have been reported within the last few days. A tragedy was narrowly averted at the reserve colliery this morning. Special Constable John McDonald, while making his rounds at Norwood Crossing, was accosted by three men and asked what he was doing.

The officer made a reply, and as he started to leave one of the men struck him with his fist. The officer grabbed his man and knocked him down. The other two assailants then started kicking the officer and landed some nasty blows on his head, chest and stomach. The man whom the officer knocked down then made his escape.

McDonald grappled with one of the assailants, and, pulling his gun, he pressed the cold steel against the other's throat and pulled the trigger. The gun missed fire and once again the trigger was pulled, with the same result.

McDonald knew one of the parties, as a man named Stein, and he was arrested this afternoon. Ball was secured and the trial set for next week before Magistrate Smith.

MONTREAL PAID TWICE FOR REMOVAL OF SNOW

Men Took Loads a Few Yards and
Then Dumped It Down.

Montreal, Que., Aug. 18.—Extraordinary revelations were made before the royal commission yesterday morning by a witness named Julien, as to the administration of the snow cleaning section of the civic road department.

In the course of his evidence the witness swore that workmen were forced upon the foreman, and that Ald. J. B. A. Martin had threatened him with dismissal unless he found work for a man named Montpelier whom that alderman sent to him.

He had known carters take a load of snow a few yards in their carts, dump it right down on the road, and return at once for another load, for which they were paid so much per voyage, and under the system as it has been practiced the foremen, if they were not honest, could pad the pay list to a considerable extent, and so obtain money from the city by false tickets without fear of detection.

BIG SEASON ON LAKES

Nearly All the Boats Will Be Operated
This Year.

Detroit, Aug. 18.—President Livingston, of the Lake Carrier Association, says:

"But 55 per cent of the lake tonnage was in commission last year. This fall between 90 and 100 per cent of the boats will be operated. Grain rates have not yet been fixed, but vesselmen expect to get three cents per bushel when the fall rush starts."

"One rate is 65 cents per ton, but in all probability and judging from the increasing conditions of prosperity, carriers will get a rate of \$1 the latter part of the season. Next season will be one of the best in the history of lake commerce, according to the present indications. All available tonnage will find business."

This is what the style show at New York shows. Men's garments are predominant in the exhibits, and it has been advanced by the heartless advocates of true fashion that men must resort to the powder puff. And the style shows it.

For example, we learn: "If you will truly chlo, don't overlook a white orchid for the lapel of your frock coat and morning coat."

"Canary-colored Ascots to match the modish chamomile gloves are an innovation of note."

"Monograms and initials on handkerchiefs are shown this season correct, but conventional. The new one is the family coat of arms."

"One hears whispers of white silk gloves for the evening dress, but it is very doubtful if they would prove acceptable."

THIRTY-EIGHT ENTER FOR THE AERIAL DERBY

All Records for Long Distance
Flights Likely To Be Broken
at Rheims.

New York, Aug. 18.—Thirty-eight aeroplanes have been entered in the aviation competitions which commence next Sunday at Rheims, France, and which will continue until the 25th. From abroad indications that all records for long distance flights will fall. The names of the pilots for the various aeroplanes have been received for competition, and the prizes for the long distance flights, have not yet been announced.

Besides the valuable cups, which have been offered for the events, 200,000 francs have been put up as prizes.

Aviation week at Rheims will open next Sunday with the French elimination races, for the international aviation cup, offered by James Gordon Bennett, and the Aero Club of France, will select three pilots, making the best flights, to represent it in the big race. The distance is 20 kilometres or twice around the aerodrome. The final contest for the Bennett cup will take place on Aug. 28.

Besides the elimination race for the Bennett cup on Sunday, there will be the opening contests for the Prix de la Vitesse, or speed prize, which is a distance of 30 kilometres, and four prizes will be distributed to the machines making the best time around the course. Aeroplanists making the best time around the course of ten kilometres will be awarded three prizes. In other contests, will be awarded three prizes, and designated winners of the Prix du Tour de Piste. The Prix des Aeronautes will be awarded to the pilot of the balloon making five tours of the aerodrome course in the best time.

On Monday the Grand Prix de la Remarque et de la Ville de Rheims will be held, and some excellent competitions from aeroplanists will be witnessed. Six prizes will be awarded to the best machines. DEAD IN THE WOODS

Unknown Robber Killed in Attempt to
Loot Depot.

North Attleboro, Mass., Aug. 18.—An unknown robber was found dead in the woods near the local station of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad tracks today several hours after he had engaged in a revolver duel with Patrolman John Jenkins of the North Attleboro police.

Shortly after midnight, Officer Jenkins surprised the man on guard at the railway station while a companion was inside the ticket office attempting to loot the safe. After refusing to obey the patrolman's command to drop his revolver, the man fired. His companion was killed at the office, and several shots were exchanged in the darkness. Both robbers disappeared in the thick woods across the railroad track. Nothing was taken from the safe.

At first it was believed that both robbers had escaped. During the forenoon, however, the body of a man was found in the woods about 100 yards below the railway station and 50 yards from the track. His face was badly bruised but a hasty examination failed to find any bullet wound. Whether the man was killed by a bullet from Jenkins' revolver, or whether he was slain by his companion, or met death by accident, will not be determined until the autopsy is concluded.

"TYPHOID MARY" NOW HAS LONDON RIVALS

Boy Strews Diphtheria Bacilli
and a Professional Man
Spreads Typhoid.

London, Aug. 18.—London has found out to its horror that it possesses several counterparts of the New York cook, Mary Mallon, who cables have told us, has been in quarantine for several years as a "germ carrier."

As a matter of fact, the medical officer of one of the principal London hospitals says that at present he has in isolation a boy who protests that he is perfectly well, but who was accidentally discovered to be a carrier of the distributer of diphtheria germs.

"As a matter of fact," the doctor says, "he is quite well, but in his throat repose the bacilli of diphtheria, which find their surroundings congenial and thrive in them. If these were transmitted to other persons there would probably be an epidemic of diphtheria among the persons brought in contact with the boy. Consequently he is kept isolated until the germs have been eradicated, but how long that will take it is impossible to say."

Even more remarkable is the case of a professional man, whose name is withheld for obvious reasons, who has been found, 29 years after suffering from typhoid, to be still carrying the germs of the disease. He exhibits no symptoms of the malady; he is in excellent health and mixes among his fellows. Nevertheless, he is an unconscious carrier of the dangerous bacilli. In medical opinion there must be a considerable number of untraceable germ carriers in London schools.

The germ carrier need not have suffered from any disease. Cases have been found of persons carrying, and no doubt distributing, the bacilli of diseases which to their knowledge they had never contracted.

Some time ago there was a serious epidemic of enteric fever in Glasgow. The medical officer first traced the outbreak to the milk supply; then he found the dairy where it had originated, and examined all the people em-

"MARY MAGDALEN" EXCITES INTEREST

Masterlinck's Biblical Drama To Be
Produced First in St. Petersburg.

St. Petersburg, Aug. 18.—The coming production of Masterlinck's new Biblical drama, "Mary Magdalen," is exciting much interest in St. Petersburg. The Russian capital has been selected for the performance because Russia has not yet given its adhesion to the Berne copyright convention. A French version is to be produced in Paris in six months.

The drama is in three acts. The first scene is laid in Bethany in the house of Annaeus Silanus, where Mary Magdalen meets Verus, a Roman commander, who becomes deeply enamored of her. She returns his love.

A crowd of people approaches without, and the voice of the Nazarene is heard: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth." The voice draws Mary irresistibly. "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." She rises to go, and repulses Verus, who vainly attempts to hold her back.

Outside Mary Magdalen is recognized by the populace, who seek to stone her, but the voice of Christ is once more heard. "He that is with out sin let him cast the first stone at her."

The second act takes place in Mary Magdalen's house. Her love for the Roman soldier is shown in conflict with the influence of Jesus. She pleads with Verus to save him from impending doom, but the Roman cannot understand her frame of mind, and the scene terminates in an outburst of jealousy on his part.

The third act takes place in the house of Joseph of Arimathea. Christ has already been cast into prison. Mary Magdalen entreats Judge Pilate, who is there at present, to free him.
