## TORONTO PAPER TALKS OF TROUBLE

Says the Irish and French Catholics of Ontario Are at Loggerheads.

### CASE OF BISHOP FALLON

Ottawa Incident Is Referred to—Some Discussion of the Matter in the French Papers.

Toronto, June 14.—The News says editorially: Uneasiness is felt by many English-speaking Catholics over the invasion in some districts of French-speaking people. The News in a recent article showed how some Separatist schools which have been English for generations are being gallicized. This article most of the French papers are discussing with some spirit. Le Temps, of Ottawa, says that the French bishops have never tried to impose the French language upon the people in their charge, and that there is certainly no desire to ostracize English-speaking Catholics. It also asserts that the French clergy always speak both languages, while too often the English clergy are unable to minister to French parishioners in their own tongue. Probably this is true.

This point is also made by L'Action Sociale, of Quebec, a newspaper which is under the direct supervision of the Quebec Hierarchy, and, therefore, no doubt, speaks with authority. But L'Action Sociale is not particularly kind in its references to the Irish minorities. "French-Canadians say that the time is come to consider their rights and the conservation of their race."

Appeals to Conciliation. They understand that these appeals to conciliation and forgetfulness with respect to the questions of language have no other object than to favor the solution of these questions for the benefit of a turbulent minority. The French majorities in some Eastern Ontario counties do not desire to proscribe English in their schools. They ask only that the teaching of French should be properly organized. Reference is made also by L'Action Sociale to the fact that the Irish has the audacity to pose as a victim.

Irish in Quebec. La Patrie asserts that in Quebec Irish clergy have a very large part of the dignities and honors of the hierarchy while in Ontario French-Canadians often have difficulty in obtaining pastors speaking their tongue. The demand of the French people in this province to have teachers who can speak French is said by La Patrie to be only a request for justice. Le Canada contentedly believes that no complaints are being made by the Irish Catholics. Le Devoir, on the contrary, attacks viciously the Catholic Register because it has complained of the gallicizing of Ontario schools.

Bishop Fallon's Troubles. It is rather noteworthy that, although the main argument of The News' article was based on the history of Ottawa College, none of the French papers that referred to the situation even so much as mentioned that institution.

None referred to the difficulties amongst the English-speaking Catholics, not because French is being taught in certain schools, but because it is being taught to the exclusion of English. The fact will not be altered by calling the Irish a "turbulent minority." The News has no desire to oppress the French settlers, and if it is the desire of a majority in any district that French should be taught, no one will object so long as English is not neglected. But an English family should be forced to move away from a home which it has had for years because the children cannot be properly educated.

### NEW HERESY HUNT IS ON AT TORONTO

Heated Debate at Methodist Conference Over Prof. Jackson's Views.

Toronto, June 13.—The Toronto Methodist Conference was drawn back this morning to the resolution of Rev. Dr. Cleaver, directed against the use of Rev. Dr. Jackson's book, or books like it, in Victoria University, when Rev. Dr. Treleven moved that it should be lifted from the table where it was laid on Saturday after Chancellor Burwash had advised the conference not to attempt to settle so big a question in such a short time.

Dr. Burns contended that the specified programme of conference should not be interrupted.

President Hincks did not want to allow discussion until the stationing committee should be summoned.

The news that the matter was coming up again spread quickly, and the church filled rapidly.

Rev. Dr. Treleven asked for permission to tell the reasons why he moved to bring the clause off the table.

Dr. Burns again registered his objections as a point of order.

that therefore the matter should not be pressed.

"When it comes to a straight issue between statements of George Jackson and Jesus Christ, I do not need a year, nor a month, nor a day to decide."

President Hincks would allow no such discussion. It was simply a matter of giving reasons why the clause should be brought off the table.

"The clause on the table will soon be a corpse if we don't take it off, and it will soon be offensive to Methodism. The tabling is equal to an indorsement of the book."

Cries of "No! No! No!" "The general public will accept it as such," repeated Mr. Treleven. Again cries of objections.

Mr. Tait persisted in his demand for years and years.

Dr. Burns said that the vote should be taken first.

"No! No!" said Mr. Tait. "You can't do me out of the vote this time."

Dr. Treleven moved that the vote be taken first, and that years and years be allowed later.

Mr. Tait: "I don't care how you do it, but I must have them this time. We cannot know if we have an accurate vote without it. We must know who is who, and what is what."

Didn't Take Them. The motion to take the clause off

the table was carried without a standing vote.

Mr. Tait, therefore, did not require the year and night's sleep.

Rev. Mr. Baker moved that a committee of five, consisting of Dr. Cleaver and Speer, and Profs. Bowles and McLaughlin, and the president, be appointed to consider the matter.

Dr. Cook—I move in amendment that inasmuch as rumors have been in circulation for years, tending to unrest in the church, concerning the teaching of some professors, the General Conference appoint a commission to investigate the question.

This motion was not seconded.

Rev. Mr. Armstrong—We are not concerned with a man particularly, or a book, but about truth. I think that if we could get below the surface we would find an equilibrium in conference.

Dr. Treleven moved in amendment that, viewing with concern the unrest and confusion in many minds, we memorialize the General Conference to consider the conservation of the essential faith of the church, especially in regard to the personality of God, the deity of Jesus Christ, and the divine revelation of the Bible. In this resolution there is no name mentioned, nor any book.

Would Teachers Resign? Dr. Cleaver resumed: "The colleges are teaching what is in Jackson's book. One professor told me yesterday: 'I shall resign if this clause carries.' 'You should resign,' I said. 'But all the professors in the country will resign.' They should do so if they teach such things," I replied. (Loud applause.)

We should have the say as to what our students should be taught. To our minds the new doctrine is poisoning the youth. Our teaching is tending towards Unitarianism, in its logical outcome. The Unitarian pastor showed how Mr. Jackson's teachings corresponded with his own.

Dr. Cleaver read a letter telling that a young graduate said that he was taught that Elisha was a myth, and that the feeding of the five thousand was but a story.

"Our students claim that the spiritual atmosphere is good. It may be, but the result is that they are becoming so mixed that they do not know where they are. We want the colleges to quit this teaching."

Loud applause. Dr. Burns said that visitors should not applaud. Hisses from the gallery. These people are as much interested in Methodism as Dr. Burns," declared one delegate. Applause from the gallery. Dr. Jackson Supported. Mr. Parsons tried to speak, but was interrupted by a question of order, followed by considerable confusion.

Mr. Parsons—I have sat under the teaching of Mr. Jackson for three years. I have heard his lectures. They were given in his sermons, but I men only on Sunday afternoon. It was his aim to bring back to faith men who have lost it.

"I have read the book. I have studied the question as a layman. I unhesitatingly say that I have been compelled to accept the views of Mr. Jackson."

Cries of "Oh! oh!"

"The effect on my own life is that I love the Bible more than I ever did. Things which have been giving me great concern have become more settled. If we adopt this clause, if it comes into legislation by the general conference, I and hundreds of others will be compelled as men of honor to leave the Methodist Church. There is no other course open to us."

As to Hell. "If you are ready for that, all right. Some of our preachers used to give us the doctrine of hell fire. You don't do it now (cries of yes, yes), because I think you have a saner view."

President Hincks—If you don't agree with a speaker, reserve your steam until you speak.

Mr. Tait—I feel sorry that Mr. Parsons has delivered such a speech. He says that if we refuse to accept Mr. Jackson's teachings, he will leave the church.

Professor McLaughlin said: "I do believe that the general spirit of the book is right. I throw back to the men who made the statement that this is Unitarianism. I believe in the deity of Jesus Christ, and I am sure that Mr. Jackson does, too. He has differed in matters of interpretation from some of you. This has been the case all through the history of the church."

"How many of you believe that the first chapter of Genesis is history? Very few of you, I am sure. I do not believe that the Book of Jonah is literal history, but I do not believe that it is one of the best examples of revelation in the Old Testament. Until today I have never been accused of unorthodoxy. I say to you who have made accusation that it is your duty to bring the charges to a court of trial; you cannot stand as men of honor if you do not." (Long applause.)

AT KINRADE GRAVE

Stranger From Burlington Spent Some Time at It Sunday. Hamilton, June 13.—For several hours yesterday a tall, well-built young man, attired in a fur-lined overcoat, stood over the grave of Ethel Kinrade, victim of Hamilton's most mysterious murder. He was not troubled by be-

ing subjected to the scrutiny of the Sunday crowds who passed through the cemetery, and the attention of the police was called to him. An officer followed him to a York street restaurant. The stranger said he was from Burlington and was merely admiring the Kinrade monument, which is one of the finest in the cemetery. He disappeared, remorseless after the interview with the officer.
