TORONTO PAPER TALKS OF TROUBLE

Says the Irish and French Catholics of Ontario Are at Loggerheads.

CASE OF BISHOP FALLON

Ottawa Incident Is Referred to-Some Discussion of the Matter in the French Papers,

ditorially: Uneasiness is felt by many English-speaking Catholics over the invasion in some districts of Frenchspeaking people. The News in a recent article showed how some Separate schools which have been English generations are being gallicised. This article most of the French papers are discussing with some spirit. Le l'emps, of Ottawa, says that the French bishops have never tried to impose the French language upon the people in their charge, and that there is certainly no desire to ostracise English-speaking Catholics. It also asserts that the French clergy always speak both languages, while too often the English clergy are unable to minister to French parishioners in their own tongue. Probably this is true. This points is also made by L'Action Sociale, of Quebec, a newspaper which is under the direct supervision of the Quebec Hierarchy, and, therefore, no doubt, speaks with authority. L'Action Sociale is not particularly kind in its references to the Irish French-Canadians that the time is come to consider their rights and the conservation of their

Appeals to Conciliation. They understand that these appeals to conciliation and forgetfulness with respect to the questions of language have no other end but to favor the solution of these questions for the benefit of a turbulent minority. French majorities in some Ontario counties do not desire to proscribe English in their schools. They ask only that the teaching of French should be properly organized." Reference is made also by L'Action Sociale to the minority "which has the audacity to pose as a victim."

Irish in Quebec.

La Patrie asserts that in Irish clergy have a very large part of the dignities and honors of the church while in Ontario French-Canadians often have difficulty in obtaining pastors speaking their tongue. The demand of the French people in province to have teachers who can speak French is said by La Patrie to ada contentedly believes that no complaints are being made by the Irish Le Devoir, on the trary, attacks viciously the Catholic Register because it has complained of ne gallicising of Ontario schools.

Bishop Fallon's Troubles. It is rather noteworthy that, ough the main argument of The News' article was based on the history of Ottawa College, none of the French papers that referred to the situation even so much as mentioned that institution.

None referred to the difficulties Father Fallon met with, nor to the necessity that drove him to Buffalo. One paper said that Mgr. Fallon had been preferred to Mgr. Meunier for Bishop of London, although nearly half the faithful in that diocese were French-Canadians.

There is a real grievance amongst the English-speaking Careal grievance tholics, not because French is being taught in certain schools, but because it is being taught to the exclusion of English. The fact will not be altered by calling the Irish a "turbulent min-The News has no desire to oppress the French settlers, and, if it is the desire of a majority in any district that French should be taught, no one will object so long as English is not neglected. But no English family should be forced to move away from a home which it has had for years because the children cannot be properly
