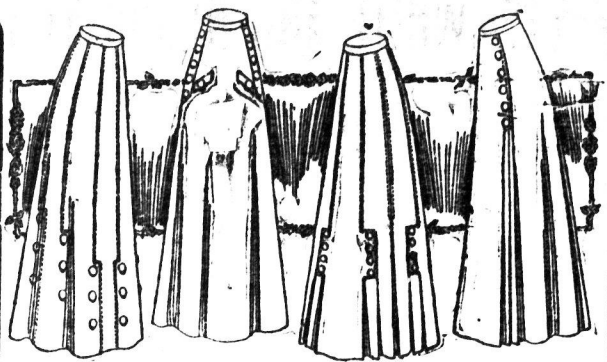

VICTORIA PARK ROADS WILL NOW BE OILED

Automobiles and All Other Vehicles Will Likely Be Excluded From the Breathing Spot.

The dust nuisance in the park will no longer worry citizens. At a meeting of No. 3 committee held yesterday afternoon, it was recommended that the tender of the Queen City Oil Company for road oil at 7.1 cents a gallon, be accepted. Mr. C. W. McGuire was present, and explained the method of treating the roads with oil, and when the samples were tested, it was recommended that he receive the contract. A car load of 1,000 gallons will be used.

It was also recommended that all vehicles be excluded from Victoria Park on Sundays. Numerous complaints have been received concerning the dust and noise caused by automobiles and other rigs, and the committee thought it wise to exclude them from the park.

As it will be some days before the oil for the park will arrive, it was recommended that Victoria Park be watered next Sunday. "This place is for the comfort of the people," said Ald. McDonald. "Let us make it comfortable for them. Sprinkling the park on Sundays will do no person any harm, but, on the other hand, will benefit many."

INGERSOLL ALLEYS IN BAD SHAPE

Police Chief Says the Back of Front Street Must Be Cleaned Up. Ingersoll, Aug. 2.—If the businessmen on the west side of Thames street do not clean up the alley in the rear of their stores, there is trouble in the atmosphere, says Police Chief Goodman. Chief Goodman, who is looking after the department end of the situation at the Hamilton Asylum after the fire, as Hon. W. J. Hanna, the provincial secretary, is on a trip to the Thousand Islands.

Sufficient accommodations were found for all the patients in the Hamilton Asylum, and consequently none of them had to be sent to Mimico or Queen's Asylum as a previous dispatch indicated.

CAMERON SWORN IN

Winnipeg Business Man Made Lieutenant Governor of Manitoba. Winnipeg, August 2.—D. A. Cameron, a well-known business man of the city was sworn in as lieutenant-governor of Manitoba to succeed Sir Daniel McMillan. Mr. Cameron stood for parliament in the Liberal ticket in Winnipeg at the last general election and was defeated. Sir Daniel McMillan's term of office had expired. It had been reported that Sir William White, vice-president of the C. P. R., who has reached the age limit, would retire and receive the appointment.

HARD WORKERS

A Seven-Day Week and Twelve Hours Per Day. Washington, Aug. 1.—Secretary Nagel, of the department of commerce, is today in a special report to the Senate on conditions of employment in the iron and steel industry in the United States, stated that "out of over 90,000 employees covered in the report, the customary working week of one-third of them was a seven-day week, Sunday not differing from other days, and approximately one-fourth of the 90,000 worked 74 hours or over per week, which, in effect, means a twelve-hour day, seven days a week, including Sunday."

RATHER DIE THAN BATHE

Chillblotche, O. Aug. 1.—Angry because the jailer had forbidden him a bath with a hose, John Tarsons, a negro, today attempted to kill himself by cutting his throat with the handle of a rusty tin cup. Hygienic reasons required that Tarsons be taken to the hospital for sanitation and the jailer used a water hose and brush.

ASYLUM FIRE DUE TO DEFECTIVE WIRING

Official Estimate of the Loss Is Placed at \$20,000.

Hamilton, Aug. 1.—The jurors empaneled by Justice McNeill to inquire into the circumstances attending the asylum fire, met at the asylum this afternoon, and after viewing the remains of the eight victims adjourned until Friday evening at 8:15 o'clock.

The cause of the fire has been put down to defective electric wiring. It broke out in the ceiling of the fourth or top story of the eastern wing, and worked into part of the main building, but was confined to the two top stories. These were gutted, and the roof burned off. The official estimate of the damage is \$15,000 to \$20,000, but unofficial estimates place it at a much higher figure, some going as high as \$60,000.

In the main building were confined some 600 patients, the males on the east side where the fire started, and the females on the west side.

DEATH OF ABBEY IS SEVERE LOSS

World Deprived of Much Fine Work Upon Which He Was Engaged.

London, Aug. 1.—Edwin A. Abbey, one of the most distinguished of American painters, died today. Not until yesterday was it realized that he was critically ill. About a month ago he was operated upon for liver trouble. It is now stated that he appeared to be recovering from the surgery when, a few days ago, he suffered a relapse, after which he slowly sank.

The afternoon papers print extended obituaries of Mr. Abbey. All speak flatteringly of his talent as a great colorist and rare draughtsman, and say that he was unequalled by any living painter in rendering medieval subjects. Mr. Abbey was so successful with his picture of the coronation of King Edward that he was invited to paint the coronation of King George, but declined. He explained that he had suffered much trouble and annoyance in completing his first work. King Edward and Queen Alexandra had shown every consideration, he said, but others of lesser rank were most exasperating in their lack of punctuality in keeping their engagements, and at the same time so vain that they exhausted his patience.

Lived Long in London. Mr. Abbey was born in Philadelphia in 1852 and was educated at the Philadelphia Academy of Fine Arts. He was but 19 years old when he was engaged by the Harper Bros. as one of their artists, and when he was 26 he was sent abroad by that firm for the purpose of illustrating English life and history. In 1878 he made London his fixed home and had lived there since. When taken ill a few weeks ago, he was engaged under the commission from the State of Pennsylvania for decorative panels in the state capitol at Harrisburg. Less than half of this work had been accomplished when he died.

Mr. Abbey exhibited his first painting at the Royal Academy in 1890. It was entitled "A May Day Morning," and this was followed by other paintings showing a master hand. Some of Mr. Abbey's most notable works are a series of large decorative panels entitled "The Quest of the Holy Grail" in the public library at Boston, executed in 1895. These great imaginative works are considered by many critics to be the high water mark of Mr. Abbey's achievements.

Received Many Honors. Mr. Abbey was a member of the Royal Academy, a chevalier of the Legion of Honor, and honorary M. A. at Yale. He was also an associate of the Royal Water Color Society. He was an author as well as an artist, and had written a large number of books on art and kindred topics. He had been honored by a membership in many of the leading art societies of Europe and America and had received decorations from several European governments in recognition of his artistic ability. In 1890 Mr. Abbey married Mary Gertrude, daughter of Frederick Meade, of New York.

The funeral will be held at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the Kingsbury Old Church near Willesden. The body will be cremated and the ashes buried at Kingsbury.

A HAITIEN TRUCE

Simon Given Three Days to Consider Resigning Office. Port-au-Prince, Haiti, Aug. 2.—The committee of foreign diplomats who visited the revolutionary camps yesterday for the purpose of arranging a truce, returned last night, having been at least partially successful in their mission. When the ministers decided that President Simon's cause was hopeless, and that if he continued to defy the enemy the occupation of the capital was almost certain to be followed by lawlessness and pillage, in which foreign interests might suffer, they urged Simon to resign. This he said he would do if a truce of three days in which the security of the city could be arranged was agreed upon. The diplomats undertook to negotiate this truce.

APPLICATION DENIED.

Washington, Aug. 2.—A general denial of all applications by express companies for relief under the long and short haul provision of the law, was entered today by the Interstate Commerce commission in cases where commodities are shipped from points of production to points of consumption, the same or similar rates.
