WHOLESALE PRICES SOARED LAST YEAR

Ottawa, March 28 .- The Minister of Labor tabled in the Commons today a report of R. H. Coats, of the department of labor, on the rise in wholesale prices, particularly during the past year. It is shown that in 1911 itors will be noticed. prices were higher in Canada than at any time, save the years 1872 and 1882 the most pronounced hoist taking place during the last half of the year Wholesale prices during 1910 were 24 per cent, higher than the average for the last ten years of the last century In 1911 this percentage went up to 27 due in great measure to the crop shortage.
