COST ONLY \$25,000

County Engineer and St. Thomas

Official Suggest a

Plan.

A Private Land Drain to Enter

Storm Sewer at Owner's

Expense.

Messrs. Edward Towse, Raymond and Sabine, residents in South London in the vicinity of Victoria bridge, waited upon the board of works last night and complained that the river was washing away its bank, and in addition, an encroaching on private property, was endangering the sidewalk and street. They claimed it was dangerous to the public also, a landslide being not unlikely at any time.

They asked that the city build a concrete retaining wall, which would cost from \$5,000 to \$8,000.

Engineer to Investigate.

Ald. Saunders, member of the city engineer's board, stated that the city engineer look into the matter.

"May we ask for prompt consideration?" asked Mr. Raymond. "If there is no possibility of our getting some treatment, we want to know. We will have to do something. It is a real danger."

Messrs. George Ingram, 1067 Florence street, and George Baker, 1067 Florence street, complained of water in their cellars, varying in depth from 13 inches to 3 feet. They claimed that a natural watercourse had been filled in by the city, making the latter responsible for the flooded condition of the cellars. The city engineer will investigate the matter.

Mr. W. Snider, of Emory street, was given permission to lay a six-inch tile drain connecting with the sewer on the street, to relieve the flooded condition of his property, but it will have to be done at his own expense.

Thought It Reasonable.

"We are not asking for anything unreasonable," said Mr. Snider, rather warmly, to Mayor Graham, when the latter carefully explained that the city could not undertake the cost of draining private property.

Mr. Hurkett, who owns a lot next to Mr. Snider, was given the same privilege, but declared that it was unfair to tax property under such conditions as high as land on high ground.

An Insinuation.

"It makes no difference in the assessment who lives there," said Mr. Hurkett.

This statement Mayor Graham objected to, and Mr. Hurkett was given a valuable property on Ridout street, which he alleged had been drained at the city's expense. He was explained that the city could not undertake the cost of draining private property.

Mr. W. W. Knowles was loud in his demands for a sidewalk on Weston street. On account of the condition of the street, he had had to pay 50 cents a ton extra for coal delivered to his factory. The work will be proceeded with, some deeds of private property necessary to the widening of the street not having been submitted until very lately.

Tenders Returned.

Tenders and checks for the West London bridge were returned. Engineers Bell, of St. Thomas, and Talbot, of Midsex County, reported that if the bridge were narrowed and reinforced piling used instead of concrete piers, it could be repaired for \$25,000. They were asked to prepare new plans.

The East London Progressive Association wrote disapproving of the garbage collection plans. Their communication was filed on motion of Ald. Saunders.

No Action Taken.

Capt. Murphy, W. A. Wilson and others petitioned that Hyman street be closed to heavy traffic. On motion of Mayor Graham, the committee recommended to council that no action be taken.

"They are just a few japs up there," said Ald. Saunders, "who want things their own way. Let them pay to make the pavement heavier."

Twelve garbage collection carts will be purchased from the Bell, Wilson and Talbot, of Midsex County, and Ald. Saunders being appointed to go to Woodstock and see that satisfactory coverings for the wagons are designed.

Crossings Must Be Flushed.

The city engineer will notify the Pere Marquette, the Grand Trunk and the London Street Railway companies that they must keep all their crossings flush with the street.

Col. Gershore, of the Hospital Trust, submitted the plans for the Victoria Hospital alterations, to cost \$23,000.

The plans were approved and tenders will be called for.

Mr. W. Allen, chief engineer at the Central fire station, was appointed assistant.
