The crew of the Conger threw him a line, as he came to the surface, which he succeeded in grasping, and hanging on for life, he shouted: "Save me! Save me! I hang on tight! I hang on tight!" He was finally hoisted aboard the boat by the crew, and even the bystanders joined in the merriment as he stepped gingerly across the deck, dripping water, at every step shaking with fear. "Oh, my, I feel so heavy!" he exclaimed. When he struck the water he had a parcel in his hands, and when pulled aboard the boat he still hung onto the parcel.

FAREWELL TO STOREHOUSE

At Request of County Council,
Board of Works Will Have
It Removed.

ENGINEER ASKS FOR HELP

The sight of the city's storehouse on the court house square is one that is far from pleasing to the esthetic tastes of the county council. With the court house slowly assuming an unusual and totally unnatural appearance at the hands of the builders—at a cost of \$50,000, it distresses their minds that such a building should mar the "landscape" effect. It is now some years since the council requested the city to have the building removed, but nothing has yet been done. Last night County Councillors Murdy and Hawshaw waited on the board of works and requested that the building be removed. Their request met with favor. The board will now recommend that tenders be called for the sale and removal of the old storage building.

Engineer Wants Aid.
City Engineer W. N. Ashplant needs assistance, so he told the board last night. He asked authority to employ temporarily a surveyor and draughtsman, at a salary of \$100 a month, and also an experienced engineering assistant at the same salary. He also put in a request that Draughtsman McNab be paid for extra time.

Ald. J. H. Saunders objected to the engineer's request. He did not oppose the assistants if they were really needed, but he believed they were not.

The committee sent the engineer's recommendation on to the council.

More Incinerator Bills.
And still the incinerator bills come! Last night there was another. This time it was from the city engineer. He wanted \$350 for the purpose of installing a light at the incinerator. The committee approved it.

The Grand Trunk requested permission to install new gates and an elevated gate cabin at Talbot street. The cabin is to be on city property. The board was not on the question of the request, but the request goes on to the council with the board's approval.

Emery Street Again.
Emery street figured in the limelight for the hundred and "steenth" time last night. The engineer recommended that the street be gravelled, graded and rolled at a cost of \$400. The cost was to be charged to the ratepayers. The request was put through, however, for the committee had promised to keep the street in repair. It will be kept safe for traffic, but nothing about the actual necessity will be done.

George Wilkey, of Lorne avenue, appeared before the board and asked permission to move out a sidewalk foot. The engineer objected, on the grounds that it would be a dangerous precedent to set, but the board voted to grant the request.

Dog Poisoner Kills Six Fine Animals

St. Marys Owners and Police Are
Looking For Miscreant.

Headed by Prince Henry of Prussia, the commander of the corps, and the Duke of Ratibor, president of the automobile club, hundreds of motor cars decorated with flowers and bunting, defiled. The Duke of Ratibor then presented the first of the innumerable addresses which the Emperor is to receive on his jubilee.

The Emperor and Empress afterwards proceeded to the stadium erected for the next Olympic games to witness a jubilee equestrian tournament. Seven thousand school children gathered in the castle court today and rehearsed the songs with which they will wake their majesties on Monday morning.
