SECRET SOCIETY OF ARMED GERMANS IN NORTHERN ONTARIO

Widespread Organization Said To Have Been Unearthed As a Result of Effort To Blow Up Powder Magazine—Three German Poles Arrested.

COBALT, March 10.—The existence of a widespread organization of alien enemies who are drilling as members of a secret society and who have arms is indicated as the result of an investigation which has been made into the attempted blowing up of the powder magazine at the Kendall shaft of the Nipissing at the beginning of the month.

As a result of the investigation three German Poles named Tom Syska, John Syska, and Walter Haentzel have been arrested. These men all live together in one shack on the Nipissing ground. After the attempt at an explosion had been discovered Tom Syska was put under suspicion. A German paper printed in Toledo was found inside the magazine with Walter Haentzel's name on the corner.

When shown the paper Syska admitted what he had done, and implicated the two other men. He said that the two others had stolen the dynamite and a fuse for the deed and he had attempted to set it off. There were 5,450 pounds of dynamite in the magazine and he had placed the fuse inside a stick of dynamite and it lit the fuse.

It was damp and would not burn and he had taken it out and in the darkness had turned it around. It had burned within a half inch of the dynamite before spark went out.

Further questioning elicited the fact that he was a member of a secret society of which three members were arrested in Timmins recently. He said that he was brought up to do the deed at one of the meetings.

It is known that there are thousands of alien enemies in the north. Vigorous search will now be made for concealed weapons.

GERMAN'S ERROR SAVED COBALT.

TORONTO, March 10.—A special to the News from Cobalt says:

A piece of fuse about two inches long, to which was attached a cap for exploding, and which was cut off in the dark by a German-Pole conspirator in the dynamite explosion, which would have carried with it death and destruction to property.

That has been revealed through the efforts of Provincial Police Inspector Rowell and Officers Lefebvre and Wilson, who followed up information laid by the Nipissing Mining Company that their powder magazine had been broken into some time during the last week in February, and an attempt made to blow it up by a stick of powder, fuse and cap.

Arrested a Week Ago.

Thomas Syszkoo was arrested a week ago, and his story was that at the instigation, and after much pressure on the part of two others, men, John Syszkoo, no relation, and Alec Hensel, he broke into the powder house, laid a stick of powder on one of the 123 cases of dynamite, and lit a fuse. In the dark he had cut off two inches of the fuse, but did not appear to know it included the cap, with the result that the explosion did not take place.

Had this happened at the time the fuse was lit, it is believed, all the mills at the south end of Cobalt would have been blown out of commission, the street railway destroyed, and much loss of life resulted, as the powder house is on solid rock and three tons would have exploded.

All German-Poles.

All three men named are German-Poles. The first man, Tom, has been in Canada thirteen years, but has visited the fatherland three times. The other two are each only 19 years of age, and have been here less than a year. They were arrested by Officer Wilson, who was accompanied by Inspector Rowell, of Toronto, commissioned by the Nipissing Company to investigate the matter. Examined by Mr. Duncan, the man who attempted to blow up the mine, the two kept after him two days to carry out the work, but as he was sober he would not comply.

One night about Feb. 21 he was drinking, and the two men gave him a parcel with the dynamite all prepared, urging him to blow up the powder house.

"Just for Fun."

"Why did you do it?" he was asked. "Oh, just for fun, I suppose," was the reply.

On returning to his boarding house the other two men, according to his version, laughed at him for making a "bad job" of the business. John Syszkoo and Hensel made absolute denial as to suggesting the deed to Tom, although admitting supplying him with the powder and fuse and cap. At a late hour last night admissions were made by both prisoners, which the police deem very important, and active operations in the district will result as a possible motive may be involved.

Great excitement reigned throughout the town at the narrow escape. The two men appeared before a magistrate today.

HIBBERT FARMER KILLED BY HORSE

Robert Bell Terribly Injured By Animal While In Stall.

Mitchell, March 11.—Robert Bell, a well-known resident of Hibbert Township, died Wednesday night as the result of kicks from his horse while he was attending to the animal in his stable. It threw him down, trampling and striking him.

The fatal injuries he received included fractured skull, shoulder and backbone, as well as severe wounds on various parts of his body.

He lingered for some hours after being removed to his home.

Mr. Bell is survived by his wife and four children.

FIRST GUNS CAUSED CONSTANTINOPLE PANIC

Geneva, via Paris, March 11.—The first guns fired by the allied fleet in the straits stopped all business in Constantinople, and you had the signal for a panic, according to Swiss travellers who have arrived here from the Turkish capital by way of Brindisi. They declare that many wealthy families are leaving for abroad.

Constantinople is said to be full of officers, including Germans. Comparatively few troops are going to the front. There are persistent reports in the capital that a large army soon will arrive from Adrianople.

BRITISH ORDERS ARE HELPING SWITZERLAND

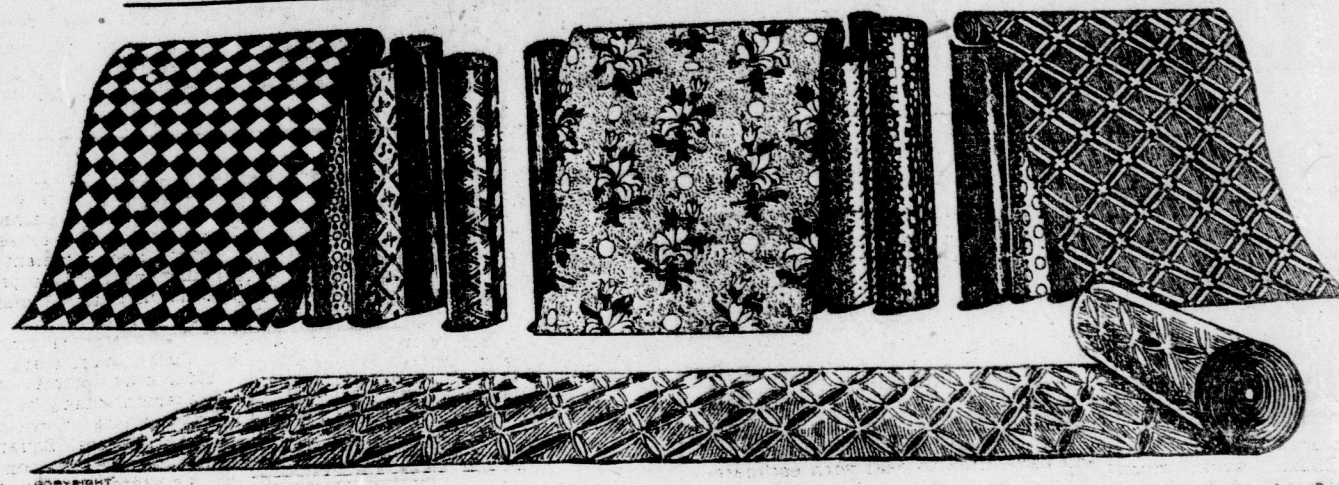
