Dr. Macgregor's Appointment Now Declared Certain

Liberated Londoner Is To Be
Prison Doctor at Jackson,
Michigan.

JACKSON, Mich., Dec. 1.—According to an unofficial source tonight, The London Advertiser correspondent, learned that it was almost a certainty that Dr. Robert A. Macgregor, of London, Ont., was chosen as the Jackson prison physician.

The medical board, it is said, after a careful study and talk with the inmates of the prison, learned that they were all in favor of the London man's appointment.

Dr. Macgregor, who is at the present time spending the American Thanksgiving with his aged parents in London, was pardoned a few days ago through the efforts of the Sanitary Medical Association, also helped to secure the appointment for the young practitioner. The inmates of the Jackson prison, it is understood, were pleased to learn that Dr. Macgregor had filed his application for the position.

According to advices from London Dr. Macgregor is said to also devote his spare time to outside practice.

D. J. McEACHREN IS CHOICE OF LIBERALS IN EAST LAMBTON

Alvinston Lumber Merchant
for Legislature Seat.

CONVENTION AT WATFORD

Every Part of Riding Represented at Rousing Rally.

WATFORD, Dec. 1.—At a largely-attended convention of the Liberals of East Lambton held here today, D. J. McEachren, Alvinston, was nominated to contest the legislature seat at the coming elections.

There were no nominations for the federal house, a convention for which purpose being slated for January next.

Every part of the riding was represented, there being a full complement of delegates, and when D. J. McEachren, the president, called the delegates to order every seat in the house was filled. The delegates displayed their credentials, and the work of nominating commenced.

The following names were submitted: H. J. Pettipiece, ex-M.P.P., Forest; R. J. McCormick, ex-M.P.P., Watford; J. H. Fowler, London; Warden W. Hall, Watford; John E. Anderson, Wyomung; Duncan White, Bosanquet; W. McDonald, Theodora; Reeve W. Annett, Brook; Dr. McE. Brown, Cambridge; E. W. Parshler, Euphemia; A. B. Connor, Alvinston, and Mr. McEachren. All the candidates dropped out except Messrs. McCormick, White and McEachren, and on the first ballot Mr. McEachren was elected by a good majority. On the motion of Mr. McCormick and Mr. White, the nomination was made unanimous.

Popular Lumber Merchant.

Mr. McEachren was for many years reeve of Alvinston. He is a lumber merchant, a native of Brooke Township, and a well-known and popular man throughout the riding. He will certainly return to East Lambton.

R. J. McCormick, the last Liberal member, in showing his name to go to the ballot, declared that for 32 years he had been in public life, and the Liberals had always stood behind him. He was offering himself again only at the solicitation of his friends. If he was considered the best man to represent the riding he would do his best to bring liberalism back to its former position. If not, he would support the candidate as well as he would support himself, and do all that he could to assist. The cause suited him; not the office.

Liberal Cause Is Best.

"I am a Liberal, and always have been," said H. J. Pettipiece, ex-M.P.P. "I would, under normal conditions, allow my name to go to a ballot, but I am interested in bigger things than my own personal future. I will withdraw, and I will guarantee to the nominee of this convention my hearty support. I have disagreed with N. W. Rowell on certain matters, but I feel that the best interests of the public can be served by a return of the Liberals to power. I will support the nominee with all my heart."

The others withdrew in order, all pledging themselves to do what they could to insure the election of the nominee.

Governments Have Failed.

"We want strength and broadness of vision in our leaders," said J. H. Fowler of The Advertiser. "Narrowness has no place, and the big fault with the Conservative party in both the Ontario and Dominion Houses of Parliament is that they have not yet lived up to the vision of usefulness before them."

"I accept the nomination," said D. J. McEachren, "because the party is united behind me. I am confident of victory, and, with the support of the delegates, there is no reason why there should not be a Liberal victory at the next election."

The Ziegler Course.

J. C. Elliott, M.P.P., East Middlesex, was introduced and spoke briefly. He criticized the Provincial Government on its zigzag policy in connection with the temperance question. In North Perth the Government announced that prohibition was merely a war-time measure. In Southwest Toronto Hon. I. B. Lucas and other advocates of a beer and wine license, but since prohibition has come actually into force and was a success, the ministers were claiming all the credit and pluming themselves on what they had done. There had been no consistency whatever in their attitude.

Warning To Be Ready.

F. F. Pardee, M.P.P., West Lambton, spoke briefly. He warned the electors to be ready for an election. There was no possibility of the life of the Dominion House being extended. That meant an appeal to the electors, and he urged the delegates to be ready. For his part, he would not consent to an extension, and he felt sure that Parliament would not agree to it.

He referred to the differences of opinion in the cabinet, the recommitments of one minister against another, and he declared that the people of Canada had no confidence in the administration of such a Government.

MR. ROWELL DECLARES SPIRIT OF FRANCE SAVED CIVILIZATION

Nation Has Had Rebirth
Since War.

WOODSTOCK, Dec. 1.—An inspiring address by N. W. Rowell, M. P. P., on the subject of "France and the War" was the feature of a concert given tonight in Oxford Street Baptist Church. Mr. Rowell, who did not reach the city until after 8 o'clock, addressed the church, where he was introduced to the audience by Principal McNell of Woodstock College.

Crossing from Canada to England, said Mr. Rowell, one realized that the war meant a great deal more to the people of Great Britain than it did to us in Canada. Crossing from England to France one noticed a still greater change in the atmosphere. To France the war meant even more than to the people of Great Britain. The battle line was still only 40 miles from Paris, and it was impossible for the people of France to forget how near the German army came to their capital, or that it is still in possession of an important part of French territory.

One could not but be impressed by the spirit of unity everywhere manifest, the "Sacred Union," as it was called. It was this spirit which explained

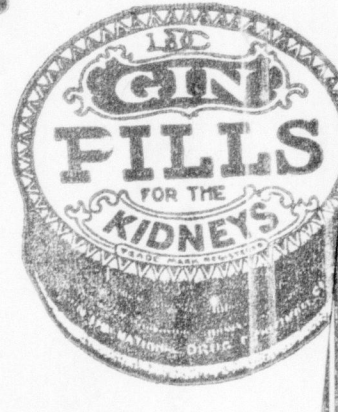
