## School Picnic Was A Record-Breaker; 16,000 Attended

Showers Did Not Interfere With the Fine Program of Sports, and Youngsters Enjoyed a Real Outing.

Although Jupiter Pluvius, assisted by a cold northwesterly wind, was not too kind on Friday, the day will always be one of the brightest spots in the memory of more than 8,000 children who attended the annual picnic of the Protestant public schools of this city in Springfield Park. Despite the unfavorable weather it is estimated that 16,000 people visited the park between sunrise and sunset.

As a result of the splendid work of the committee who organized the outing the picnic was undoubtedly the most successful ever held. The program, which had been carefully prepared and advertised long in advance, was adhered to closely by the different schools, and everything was carried out according to the plans. The attendance, too, as far as the children were concerned, was much larger than in any previous year, although the unsettled weather discouraged many parents from attending.

Had a Great Time. From early morning until noon innumerable cars and their trailers took a steady stream of children to the park to the tune of "Soda Water, Soda Water, Ginger Beer and Pop," sung by husky young voices in many different keys. From then until late in the evening the park was filled with great confusion of sounds, as everywhere the young picnickers romped and played.

Afternoon Games. In the afternoon the Collegiate Institute and the Technical School held their sports, and then baseball held sway until twilight came. Several schedule games were played, as well as many impromptu ones.

The first of these was a game played by picked teams representing the north and south of the city. After five innings of some real baseball the southerners won by the score of 8 to 6. When the smoke and dust of battle had cleared away it was found that the northerners had emerged victorious, with the score standing 6 to 5.

The first exhibition of ground hockey in this district was played by the girls of the collegiate institute. Teams chosen from the senior classes played strenuously, but they were so evenly matched neither team secured a goal. Previous to the hockey game the girls of the first and second years of the college played baseball. The second year girls won easily by a margin of ten goals.

Play Fast Ball Games. The comedy of the day was crowded into a five-inning baseball game (with apologies to all other ball games), in which the principals, lined up on one side, locked horns with the trustees. Neither team won as far as it is known.

The official scorer lost count on the runs several times, but at the end he estimated that the score was 4 to 3. The teachers lost the game, but in the last inning their pitcher, Dr. Bryant, "blew," and six runs were garnered by the trustees, making the score 10 to 8. The scorer announced these figures without blushing.

Assistant Principal Campbell, also of Lord Roberts, was at the receiving end for the principals. Trustee Eggett commenced pitching for his colleagues, but was derided in favor of Trustee Langford when the principals started their heavy hitting. Mr. Eggett let them in to catch, and Mr. Hutchinson was sent to the outfield after playing a brilliant game behind the plate.

The game proved the closing act of the day, officially speaking, although the zoo and the various amusements continued to attract crowds until late in the evening.

## METHODISTS HOLD MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR FOUR PASTORS

Tributes Paid To Ministers Who Have Died During the Year.

### CHURCH UNION DISCUSSED

Rev. Thomas Symington Conveys Greetings From Presbytery To Conference.

An impressive memorial service for Methodist ministers of the London Conference who have died during the past year was conducted in Assin Street Church Friday afternoon. Rev. George Daniel, M.A., Ph.D., of Chatham, being the principal speaker. Four members of the conference, three of whom were from Exeter District, and one from London District, who succumbed to illness since the last conference, were eulogized at the service. They were Rev. E. G. Powell, Lucan; Rev. John G. Kennedy, Exeter; Rev. J. G. Yelland, Parkhill; and Rev. G. Howson of this city.

After the eulogies of the deceased had been read and resolutions passed incorporating them in the conference minutes, Dr. Daniel began: "This is the conference hour of mourning, and with sorrowing hearts and subdued emotion we are here to pay a respectful tribute to the memory of our brethren who have fallen in the ranks. Some of them have passed away so recently we can hear the echoes of their voices. Though far away they are near to us, and though dead they yet speak to us."

Four Deaths During Year. "We have four brethren who have been translated. Why mourn them with tears?" I have known all four for 28 years at least, three of them being in my district. Rev. G. Howson was never out of my mind. He died in active work, superannuated. He died in a godly man, a faithful minister of the word. I liked Rev. J. G. Yelland's genial manner and learned to love him. Rev. E. Powell did not die because of a sudden attack of age, but simply because, with his tasks like a soldier in the field, he died with the weight of his armor. He is gone home.

"I love to talk of the men of God, whose life is an inspiration. Don't talk of death. They have merely crossed the river. Some of us look across the water as we are moving that way; I will sum up in a few words the life of each of them in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty."

Rev. E. G. Powell, who at one time preached at Fort Stanley and Delaware, was secretary of the Huron County Temperance Association at the time of his death at Lucan, May 17 last.

Rev. John G. Kennedy died March 2, 1931. He was a former pastor of Hill Street Methodist Church in this city. Rev. J. G. Yelland's death took place August 9, 1930, while Rev. G. Howson, a former pastor of Assin Street Church, died 48 years in the Methodist ministry, died November 21, 1930. During the service special hymns were sung by the many delegates who filled the church to capacity.

Prior to the memorial service Rev. Thomas Symington of Knox Presbyterian Church, London, addressed the session, conveying cordial greetings from the presbytery of the district to the conference. "We want to work together and co-operate," he declared.

"We do not want to take advantage of one another's mistakes. We believe in leading us to larger things and better places. Even should our church be wrong in its decisions, what shall we do?"

"We have been moving to a better feeling. Great changes have taken place in both the ranks of our churches. I bring to you on behalf of the presbytery of London the sincerest greetings and our assembly will be glad to hear that you have our confidence and our friendship. I believe we will stand together and true to one another, even though for the time being we may think the other is in a mistake, because we are one in the Lord."

Reasonable Progress. To which Rev. Dr. Thomas Manning, former pastor of Dundas Centre Church here, replied: "I believe there are a good many reasons why the Presbyterians should not start church union, but I see more reasons why they should. I believe they are making reasonable progress. I do not see how they can go any faster. They have my sympathies. (Laughter). I assure my brethren that this conference reciprocates in an equally fraternal manner every expression of sympathy and cordiality that comes from the Presbyterian Church."

During the session Rev. W. E. Donnelly of Wallacburg was elected conference statistician. Rev. Frank Langford, secretary of the general board of Sunday schools and young people's societies. He urged a larger appeal to the churches asking \$5,000 this year.

Resolution of Appreciation. A resolution of appreciation and support of the conference was passed on a motion by Rev. J. G. Yelland. The report of the committee on religious education, Sunday school enrollment totals, 2,267 for the conference. He stated that there are 11,000 boys and girls in the conference between the ages of 12 and 17 years and urged the pastors to take the best interest to retain them for the Sunday school.

The report concluded by urging the distribution of official Methodist publications in the Sunday schools.

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Apply Gospel Ethics. Rev. H. J. Uren, of the Mitchell Methodist Church, said: "Our thoughts and interest tonight have centred in this class of young men, adding that the hearts of the congregation had been strangely warmed by their testimonies. The realization that God needed the young men would save them from mere professionalism in the ministry, he said. He told the members of the class that they must apply the ethical standards of the gospel to present conditions. "Are we willing to pay the price of fidelity to God?" he asked.

J. W. Hibbert of Essex, president of the conference, charged the young men that they not minimize the great and
