

URGE PORTABLE SCHOOL ANNEX

St. Thomas Trustees Seek Solution For Crowded Collegiate Problem.

Prepare Plans For Additions To Two Public Schools.

ST. THOMAS, July 20.—Plans will be drawn for four-room annexes for Myrtle and Balacava Street Schools, and the advisability of using a portable building as an annex to the collegiate institute will be examined into, it was decided at a meeting of the board of education Thursday night.

The public school annexes will cost the city approximately \$52,000 each, and the balance of \$125,000, which the city council will be asked to provide, will be used in the purchase of adjoining properties and equipment.

Darrach & Findlay, local architects, tendered a sketch of the proposed annexes, and on the motion of Trustee Dr. F. E. Bennett, it was decided to proceed as the plans indicated. The structures will be two stories in height, and will contain four classrooms each. A 1-story inclosed passageway will join them with the main buildings. Their proximity to the main buildings will not interfere with the lighting, Mr. Darrach said.

STAB FROM STICK BRINGS LOCKJAW

Brantford Lad Precariously Ill From Wound Accidentally Inflicted by Playmate.

It was thought at first that the wound was not serious, but in time the jaw of the youngster started to lock, and Dr. Wiley was called in.

The lad is today in a precarious condition as a result of the stabbing. It is stated that the injury was quite accidental, and no blame is attached to the young friend, who, it is alleged, inflicted the wound.

ASSERTS PONZI IS AT NEW SCHEME

DETROIT, July 20.—The fact a cell is his counting house and a grey striped uniform his business suit are unimportant, it seems, in the get-rich-quick activities of that old acquaintance, Charles Ponzi of Boston, owner of the generation's most vivid Mississippi bubble complex.

Ponzi, to hear Charles McKee, Arkansas banking commissioner, tell it, is using his five-year term in the Plymouth, Mass., prison to prepare for the day when it will end.

"What his new little scheme is, I haven't fathomed," said Commissioner McKee before the convention of National Association of Supervisors of State Banks in Hotel Statler, Wednesday. "But no doubt it will be good."

"Thirty days ago he wrote from his prison cell 'bank' asking for reports of my office. He said he was preparing legislation which would eliminate any possibility of the public losing money in banks. That young man has nerve. He added that his failure could be traced directly to the Massachusetts banking commissioner. He should have stopped him earlier," he explained.

STATE SOCIALISTS STRONG IN BERLIN

Big Political Battle Looms As Bourgeois Oppose Coalition.

BERLIN, July 20.—Attempts of the moderate bourgeois party to form a bourgeois group in the Reichstag, including the industrial people's party, as a counterpart to the alliance of the two Socialist parties and so preventing the Socialist tag from wagging the government dog—Wirth's coalition—are meeting with many difficulties.

Not the least was the decision of government Socialists, by an overwhelming majority, to refuse to continue a government, broadened to the right by inclusion of the industrial people's party.

They consider that party too tainted by monarchist convictions to be trusted colleagues in an administration whose main task now is defense of the republic against monarchist and militarist intrigues.

The two bourgeois parties now in the coalition—the Centre and the Democrats—equally are opposed to remaining in a coalition where the

180 Socialists of both brands would be half again as strong as the bourgeois membership.

President Ebert and Chancellor Wirth are continuing their efforts to prevent a rupture of the coalition and the dreaded appeal to the country in a new election.

Socialists and most Berlin papers hold dissolution is almost inevitable, but it is fairly possible that a compromise will be reached.

An amazing story of the inception of the Rathenau plot has been put out. Statements by suspects show the plot was conceived by two 16-year-old schoolboys and later taken up by a small group of youthful Berlin fanatics. This version tends to clear the terrorist and reactionary organizations heretofore blamed for the assassination.

Meanwhile the reparation problem continues to cast the gloomiest shadow over Germany's future.

The French proposal to grant concessions only on condition that the interest service on the internal debt is to be suspended and this revenue applied to the payment of reparations, would imply a complete breakdown of the German financial system, since close to 100,000,000,000 marks in interest bearing treasury certificates now are in the hands of private holders, and immediately would be thrown back upon the Reichsbank.

TWO LITTLE GIRLS HIT BY AUTOMOBILE NEAR PARIS

Children Playing by Roadside Said to Have Run in Front of Motor.

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INVESTIGATE USE OF OIL FOR FUEL

Research Committee To Undertake New Inquiries To Find Substitute For Coal.

OTTAWA, July 20.—(By Canadian Press).—The research council is keeping in close touch with the domestic fuel situation, which has been reported by the mines branch of the bureau of statistics to be acute, and may shortly undertake new investigations in this connection. The inquiries which may soon be taken up have to do with the use of fuel oil in domestic furnaces.

Two circumstances have combined at the present time to bring the question of fuel oil for domestic use to a head. The outstanding cause is, of course, the fuel shortage. But in addition to that there are conditions in the oil trade that help to make oil an attractive fuel.

The oil that is used as fuel is the reserve that is left after gasoline and some of the lighter fractions have been taken out. The oil companies have abundant demand for gasoline, but the demand for the reserve is slack, and consequently it is available at a price that may make it economical to use it for domestic heating.

The research council may make an investigation of this remedy for the fuel shortage. There are already under way two developments, initiated by the research council and the department of mines, which bear upon the question of the fuel shortage.

One of these is the experiments in the production and marketing of peat, which is now being carried on by the mines department, and which has reached the stage of trying out the commercial possibilities of the fuel. The other relates to the lignite deposits of Southern Saskatchewan. For some years now experiments have been carried on at Bienfait, Sask., in the carbonizing and briquetting of lignite, the cost being divided between the Dominion and the provinces of Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

Difficulties have been met in the carbonizing of lignite, and renewed experiments are being made this summer with a view to removing them. If these experiments are successful lignite fuel may be available this fall.

Charles Merritt, Toronto, was in the truck, too, but was uninjured.

TO TAKE VOTE ON LIQUOR QUESTION

WINNIPEG, July 20.—"The United Farmer members of the Legislature are standing firm for a referendum on the liquor question before June, 1933," stated W. R. Wood, secretary of the United Farmers of Manitoba, today.

"As an association, however, they will do all in their power to defeat a bill providing for government control," he said, "but they certainly will let the electors decide the question."
