Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, April 20.-The Legislature got ahead with considerable business today. Before the orders of the day H. H. Dewart brought up the question of the Gregory Hydro Investigating Commission, sitting after this Legislature had been dissolved. He wanted to know if the commission would submit its final report before the house dissolved. The premier said that he understood the commission would sit again on May 12 for a few days taking evidence and there-Mr. Dewart immediately moved the adjournment of the house to discuss the matter. He declared that the hydro commission evidence would be used as political football during the election and that the commission responsible course" when there was no parliament.
