Fire Chief Attacked For Leaving City To Aid Farmer

FIRE CHIEF WITH SIX MEN **ABSENT FROM CITY 9 HOURS** FIGHTING BLAZE IN COUNTRY

Mayor Attacks Action-Declares Citizens Left in Danger-Had No Proper Authority To Take Fifteen-Mile Trip -Claims No Lives in Danger From Blaze in Barn.

CHIEF STATES HE USED OWN JUDGMENT

John Aitken, chief of the London fire department, was vigorously attacked by Mayor Wenige today for alleged bad judgment

in answering to a fire in Lobo township last night. Leaving the city, without any authority except his own, the chief took a detachment of six men and the pumper truck and answered a call to the McInroy farm on the Nairn road. The detachment was away for nine hours.

Mayor Wenige censures the action of the chief, claiming permission should have been secured. Chief Aitken defends himself and declares that he has the right to help out in fighting rural blazes if apparatus is available and the fire is serious enough to justify a response.

Chief Aitken took six men and the \$17,000 pumper truck to a fire on the farm of A. N. McInroy, concession 9, Lobo, on the Nairn gravel road. The call came in a few minutes to 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The department returned nine hours later,

at 1:55 o'clock this morning. Firemen Bishop, Reid, Hartopp, Mason, Bolton and Smithson went out to the fire, acting on the chief's orders.



BRITISH HOUSE DISSOLVES TONIGHT, ELECTION OCT. 29

King George Signs Proclamation Upon Request of Premier MacDonald.

PREMIER'S ATTITUDE

made after Premier MacDonald, coming this afternoon before the house,

Agrees to Dissolution. The prorogation, Mr. MacDonald said, would be conditional upon the final passage of the bill creating an Irish boundary commission. It is

Mr. MacDonald left Buckingham palace after an audience which began at 16 o'clock and lasted an hour.

It was officially announced that he had asked the king for the dissolution of parliament, in line with his previously announced policy of appealing to the country through a general election to approve the course pursued by his government.

It was understood that the question of the resignation of the cabinet by the city council to undertake negotiations, and returned with a price of \$1,400,000.
