

Gift of Tongues Follows Conversion By Telephone

Woman Phones To Pentecostal Evangelist and Is Saved.

DROPS TO FLOOR

Conversions over the telephone have gone into the records of the work of the Pentecostal revival here. Rev. William Booth Clibborn, who has been holding evangelistic services at the Pentecostal hall where many have been converted lately had an interesting experience yesterday when a woman was converted by telephone.

A woman who had never attended any of the meetings telephoned Mr. Booth Clibborn to the effect that she did not think that so much enthusiasm in the manner of worship was necessary. She took particular exception to audible "Praise the Lord" and "Hallelujah."

The minister told the young woman something of the workings of the pentecostals. Ten minutes after, the girl's mother telephoned to say that her daughter had been struck by the power of the Holy Ghost and had dropped to the floor, where she was speaking in tongues.

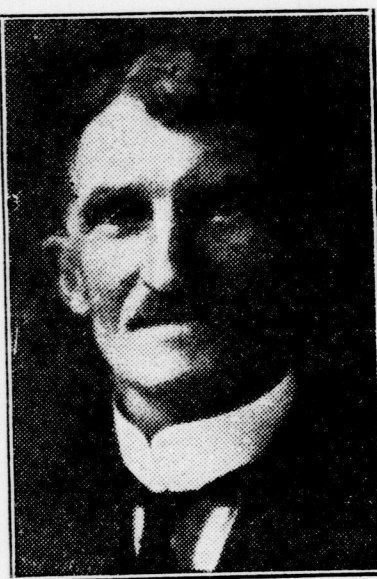
A Jewish maid working in the house told the mother that her daughter was saying, "O God, save sinners," in Hebrew, a language she did not understand.

CADET MOVEMENT MISUNDERSTOOD

General MacBrien Says It Is Part of National Defence.

The cadet movement in Canada offers boys physical training, education and discipline, which has a direct bearing on character building. The military aspect of the work is practically negligible, is the opinion of Major-General J. H. MacBrien, chief of staff, department of national defence, Ottawa, who made the annual inspection of headquarters, military district No. 1, yesterday.

Major-General MacBrien says that the controversies that have taken place regarding cadet corps have arisen out of misunderstandings regarding the training, that the best of the Boy Scout ideals are incorporated in the work. These ideals will

be something worth the boys' carrying through life.

Canada does not carry the cadet movement as far as the United States schools do, said the major-general, and the lack of understanding of the whole cadet program in this country has led to confusion. Where there has been opposition and the matter has been explained, the cadet movement has found warm friends.

In Western Ontario there was more opposition to the training than elsewhere, declared Major-General MacBrien. This was not alone due to the lack of knowledge of that feature, but there was a lack of understanding of the underlying principles which formed the basis of the national defence program. This was true of all Canada. It was more noticeable in the dominion than in Australia and other colonies. The workings of the national defence permanent force was one of the greatest mediums of education in the country. It offered a training which was of the greatest value to the individual as well as to the state. For that reason it merited a support and an enthusiasm which he felt, had not been publicly manifested to a deserved extent.

The aviation branch of the permanent force was one instance. He showed that the department's air force was patrolling the timber limits of Ontario which came under federal jurisdiction. Men had been trained for a special work which was a distinct value both to the state and to the men.

FERGUSON SENDS SHAFTS AT U. F. O.

Investment of \$15,000 in Reformer Charged in Fighting Speech.

BONDS PRODUCED

Toronto, March 24.—In the dying moments of the budget debate in the Legislature this afternoon, Tory tactics suddenly switched and resulted in a desperate attempt to pin upon members of the Drury government, knowledge of the disposal of the \$12,000 unaccounted for in the records of the Home Bank, a sum which government supporters had previously argued, had never left the offices of the bank, but had been swallowed up through "internal bookkeeping."

As a grand pyrotechnic finale to the debate, Premier Ferguson in a fighting speech of an hour's duration, charged Peter Smith with investing the sum of \$15,000 in the Oshawa Reformer, when that paper was taken over in 1922 by J. C. Ross, former editor of the Farmers' Sun.

"Squeezed Out."

Ross, the prime minister declared, had been "squeezed out" of the Sun because of his adherence to the Reformers, following the breach between the Drury-Morrison factions.

Smith's investment had been made through Aemilius Jarvis, Jun., who held the stock in trust for him, and was, the prime minister implied, an attempt to gain control of the Reformer as an organ of the U. F. O. government, following the victory of the Morrison faction in gaining control of the Sun.

With a dramatic flourish, Ferguson spread upon his desk Province of Saskatchewan bonds to a value of \$4,800, which, he declared, had been turned over to the crown by Aemilius Jarvis, Jun., as part of the funds used in the transaction.

Sorry for Smith.

"He," Ferguson declared, referring to Smith, "is the only one of your late government I have any sympathy for. Every one of you threw him down, after he was taking all kinds of chances, even to committing crimes, trying to keep your government going when it was tottering with ruinous to a fall."

"My honorable friend (Mr. Raney) smiles. It is the smiles of death. Give us time, and we will find the rest of this \$42,000 and bring it home to your government just as closely as this."

The prime minister challenged Messrs. Raney and Sinclair to state whether they believed Hon. T. W. McGarry, former provincial treasurer would perjure himself before the public accounts committee, to which

Chatham Plans Depot For Buses

Chatham, March 24.—City Manager C. H. R. Fuller is conducting an investigation to decide on a central location, which will form a terminal for motor buses plying between Chatham and various other places.

The Liberal leader replied with a pertinent reminder that the present debate was not a "catchem class." L. W. Oke of East Lambton, a U. F. O. "die hard" and bolter from the Progressive group, further enlivened the discussion by divulging, on the floor of the house, secrets which he declared had been discussed at a confidential U. F. O. caucus, with reference to obtaining editorial control of the Farmers' Sun.

Majority of Fifty.

The government received a majority of 50—slightly lower than those recorded on the speech from the throne—on the division which wound up the debate. The vote was a straight party one, with the Liberal and Progressive groups solidly supporting the Raney amendment, and the three Labor members, as well as L. W. Oke, voting with the government. Beniah Bowman Oke's fellow U. F. O. bolter, absented himself from his seat during the division and watched the proceedings from behind the scenes.

W. E. N. Sinclair, in a brief address preceding the prime minister's utterances, warned the house against "stultifying itself" by rejecting the amendment. He took Mr. Raney to task for failure to probe the relations between the Home bank and the Hearst government during his term of office as attorney-general, but insisted that the present government could not becloud the toll-gate issue by dragging extraneous matter into the debate.

Col. J. A. Currie's government control bill also made its first appearance in the house today.

MATCH FIRM WOUND UP. FACTORY LOST IN BLAST

Toronto, March 24.—Chief Justice Meredith today made an order winding up the Continental Match Company of Aurora, incorporated in 1920. The stock issued was \$225,000, which is impaired to upwards of \$150,000. The company has never operated. An explosion wrecked its factory last December before the equipment was complete, when E. E. Shortall, the practical man behind the concern, was killed.
