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# NAVIGATION TRANSPORTATION, ETC BY-LAW NO.5 FANCY GOODS AND TOY

FOR A.D. 1889.

To authorize the issue of Debentures to the extent of Seven Thousand Dollars for the purpose of obtainthe real property requisite for erecting a High School House thereon, for erecting said High

school House thereon, and for other High School purposes.

Whereas, the Lucan High School Board, on the 27th day of March, A. D. 1889, applied to the Council of the Municipality of the Village of Lucan, under "The Act respecting High Sc ools and Collegiate Institutes," for the sum of seven thousand dollars for the burpose of obtaining, within the said village, the real property requisite for erecting a High School thereon, for the building and furnishing of said High School House, for fencing said real property when obtained, and for the maintenance, accommodation and other necessary expenses of said High School TORONTO AND MONTREAL. and other necessary expenses of said High

School.

And, whereas, the aforesaid Council are unanimously in favor of granting said application, and are willing to raise the said sum for the purpose aforesaid by the issue of debentures to the extent of the aforesaid seven thousand dollars; but with a view of obtaining an expression of the opinion of the electors of the said municipality upon the matter, the said Council deem it advisable to submit the question to the vote of the said electors before raising the aforesaid sum of seven thousand dollars, which is the debt intended to be created by this By-law for the purpose aforesaid.

And, whereas, for paying the interest on the said debentures to be issued under the authority of this By-law it will require the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars, and to pay the principal of the same at maturity, it will require the further sum of two hundred and eleven dollars and soventy five cents, to be reised annually by and seventy-five cents, to be raised annually by a special rate during the currency of the said

debentures.

And, whereas, the amount of the whole ratable

And, whereas, the amount of the whole ratable property of the municipality of the village of Lucan, according to the last revised assessment roll, is one hundred and fifty-five thousand and twenty dollars.

And, whereas, the amount of the existing debenture debt of the said municipality of the village of Lucan is eighteen hundred dollars, and no portion of the principal or interest thereof is in arrears.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the said village of Lucan as follows:

1. It shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said village of Lucan, and he is hereby directed and authorized to issue debentures of the said muni-

authorized to issue debentures of the said municipality of the village of Lucan to the amount of seven thousand dollars, for the purpose aforesaid, in sums of not less than one thousand dollars, and the said municipality of the purpose aforesaid, in sums of not less than one thousand dollars, and the care of the said municipality of the said municipality. said, in sums of not less than one thousand dol-lars each, and not exceeding in the aggregate the said sum of seven thousand dollars; and such debentures shall be signed by the said Reeve and countersigned by the Treasurer, and sealed with the seal of the corporation of the village of Lucan, and the said debentures shall have at-tached to them coupons for the payment of in-terest

terest.
2. The said debentures shall be made payable

2. The said debentures shall be made payable at the expiration of twenty years from the date hereinafter mentioned, for this By-law to take effect at the office of the Treasurer of the said village of Lucan.

3. The said debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of five percentum per annum, payable half-yearly, on the fifteenth day of January and July in each and every year during the currency of said debentures.

4. This said sum of three hundred and fifty dollars to pay the interest, and the said sum of two hundred and eleven dollars and seventy-five cents to pay the principal of the said debentures or such sums as may be necessary for the

five cents to pay the principal of the said debentures or such sums as may be necessary for the payment of the said interest and principal shall be raised and levied in each year during the currency of said debentures by a special rate sufficient therefor on all the ratable property in the municipality of the village of Lucan.
