Toronto, June 29, 8 p. m.—During last night an energetic storm developed over the upper lakes, and the centre has since moved quickly eastward to the lower St. Lawrence, being now near Quebec. A fresh northwesterly gale has prevailed on the lakes since early morning. The weather continues cool in Manitoba, and during the next two days will be quite cool in Ontario. Minimum and maximum temperatures:—Victoria, 54-58; Calgary, 44-52; Port Arthur, 42-48; Winnipeg, 40-42; Toronto, 42-48; Montreal, 36-40; Quebec, 36-40; Halifax, 36-40.  
Forecast:—Lower Lakes and Georgian Bay—Westerly to northerly winds; fair and quite cool.  
Local Temperatures:—June 29—Highest, 71 degrees; lowest, 53 degrees.
