Over a Hundred and Twenty-five Thousand Deaths in Russia Alone.

NEW YORK, Aug. 31.—The German steamer Moravia from Hamburg is anchored in Green Bay, out of the usual track of the vessel. She flies the yellow flag. The baggage and effects of 22 victims will be subjected to bacteriological examinations to ascertain whether the deaths were caused by Asiatic cholera. There are no new developments on board.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The actual arrival of Asiatic cholera at the port of New York has brought to the front the question of suspending immigration to this country altogether during the prevalence of cholera in the Eastern hemisphere. Government officers are ransacking the records and reading up former records. Secretary Spaulding thinks that foreign immigration could be suspended, but he cannot say that such action was immediately contemplated.

Surgeon general Wyman, of the U. S. marine hospital service has requested the health officers at Montreal, Quebec, and Grosse Ile to notify him of any suspected emigrants coming from infected districts to this country, which leave Whitehall at 2 o'clock on Monday are in the hands of the Queen early the next morning, and back on Wednesday.
