Government Reports Fraudulently Used by Promoters-Director Brock Calls Attention to Evil Practices

OTTAWA, Feb. 8.—That the practice of misusing government reports in connection with wildcat mining schemes is an evil with which the mining industry of Canada has to to contend, was the statement made by R. W. Brock, director of the geological survey, in discussing the question some time ago.
