BE WINTON AND MANITOBA CENTRAL RY.

This is a line projected by General Rosser, late Chief Engineer of the C, P, R,, who is largely interested both in De Winton and Minnedosa. The following is clipped from the Marquette Review of the 3rd March inst.:

"On Wednesday, the 22nd of February, there was a large gathering of the settlers of the County of Minnedosa, in the town of that name. The meeting was called by General Rosser and Thomas Ferris, of this place, to consider the advisability of giving a bonus to the De Winton and Manitoba Central Ry. Those present were quite in union with the scheme and after hearing addresses from Measrs. Crear and Armitage, of Minnedosa, as also Gen. Rosser's explications as to the proposed route of this important pladations as to the proposed route of this important Railway, promises of a land bonus for station grounds, and right of way were given by the citizens. The success of this railway is certain, as the charter is asked for by local capitalists who are quite able to earry it through."

\*\*MIN NEDOSA!\*\* surnamed "THE BEAUTIFUL," from its natural beauty and special advantages, has, without the aid of any grailway, already become a populous and thriving town. It has been selected as the Assize Town and centre of the vast Judicial District in which it is situated. General Rosser, late Chief Engineer of the Canada Pacific Railway, is largely interested in this town, and having also a large property in De Winton, has undertaken the construction of a railway connecting these important points. The land adjoining the town on the North and East is hilly and incapable of being used as part of the town, a fact which lends increased value to that lying to the South.

"Brandon, Minnedosa, Portage la Prairie, and other first-class towns like these, in a short time will become cities, and will also require an immense number of artisans, and an army of laborers will be wanted on the different railways.—From the Ottawa Citizen, in an account of an interview with Mr. Latouche Tupper.

"General Rosser, accompanied by Mr. Ferris, of the Portage, arrived here Tuesday night, and as soon as the object of his visit was made known (railway matters) a meeting of the inhabitants we called in the Town hall, when the General very ably addressed the meeting on the De Winton and Manitoba Central Railway, it having been located to this point by one of his engineers last fall. He made known to the meeting that as soon as he understood what encouragement would be given by the town towards the road, either by money or land grant, he was in a position to give assurance to that meeting of the road being graded to Minnedosa in sixty days after the disappearance of the snow, and if the rails could be procured, to have them laid in forty days thereafter, the distance only being forty miles, and taking less than 100,000 feet of timber for bridges. The road will pass through one of the finest agricultural districts in the North-West. The meeting was presided over on railway matters, aby followed by Messra. Armitage, Roche, Denison and Manby. It was one of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings ever assembled in this town, the hall being densely crowd.

offive. Messrs. A. mitage, Roche, Crerar, Fisher, and Leslie, to take into consideration what could be done in the premises.
