A FUND FOR NURSES. Delegates from the B. N. F. N. to Visit Toronto in its Interests. A meeting will be held at the General Hospital, Wednesday evening, for the purpose of creating an interest here in the Royal National Fund for Nurses, it will be addressed by Mr. Henry C. Burdett and Thomas Bryant, F.R.C.S., of Guy's Hospital, both of whom are touring North America in the interests of the association. Dr. O'Reilly, superintendent of the Toronto General Hospital, has been instrumental in bringing them here. Owing to the limited time before the meeting, the chairman and trustees of the hospital cannot possibly send out individual invitations, but are of the opinion that the best interests of the nurses of the Dominion would be promoted if the press of Ontario would take an active part in the movement, so that as many nurses and persons at a distance could be informed of the meeting to be held on Wednesday evening next, in time to enable them to make an effort to be pressent. A meeting will be held at the Gener

The R.N.F.N. was inaugurated in 1887 and

The R.N.F.N. was inaugurated in 1887 and is now established on a permanent basis under royal patronage. H.R.H. the Prince of Wales is president. The invested funds alone amount to over £100,000. The founder of the fund is Mr. Henry C. Burdett of London and Mr. Thomas Bryant is the well-known consulting surgeon of Guy's Hospital and president of the Royal College of Surgeons of England. The chief object of the fund is to afford the nurses an absolutely safe means of providing, at the lowest possible cost to themselves, an allowance during incapacity for work caused at the lowest possible cost to themselves, an allowance during incapacity for work caused by sickness or accident, and a certain income for their declining years. This object is carried out by receiving and investing such fixed periodical sums as those who join the fund can afford, by adding to the pensions all the profits arising from any source, and by supplementing those sums from a donation fund created and maintained by those interested in nurses and nursing institutions. This fund is open to all responsible officials connected with hospitals and kindred institutions, and no medical examination is required on joining. required on joining.


