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A BELGIUM MINE HORROR.

300 PERSONS KILLED BY AN EX-  
PLOSION.

The Noise Resembled an Earthquake and  
the Whole Locality Was Shaken—  
Heartrending Scenes at the Mouth of  
the Shaft—The Rescuers Were Sentenced  
to a Month's Imprisonment.

BRASSERIA, March 11.—An explosion oc-  
curred today at the Anderlecht colliery in  
a gallery 400 feet below the surface.  
There were working in the mine 270 men.  
Of the number 40 escaped by means of the  
second shaft and 10 others were rescued in  
a terrible and it is believed, fatally injured  
condition. It is feared that of the men in  
the mine 200 have been killed.

The explosion occurred at 8 o'clock this  
morning. It was very heavy and the  
shock caused by it resembled an earth-  
quake.

The ground for a large area in the  
vicinity of the colliery rocked and trembled  
for several seconds from the immense force  
exerted by the exploding gas.

Houses were shaken to their foundations,  
windows were loudly rattled and smashed  
and crockery and other articles of house-  
hold were thrown about and broken.

The residents of the place were paralyzed  
by fear while these astounding scenes were  
being enacted. They were so terrified that  
they were unable to do anything to help  
the sufferers.

The explosion was followed by a series of  
smaller ones, which caused much damage  
to the buildings and to the machinery.

The rescuers were sentenced to a month's  
imprisonment for neglecting their duties.

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THE OXFORD SCANDAL.

Tutor Morland, the Begun Widow, Gets 10  
Years at Hard Labor.

LONDON, March 11.—A large crowd, com-

Criminal Court, Old Bailey, today to listen  
to the trial of Maitland Francis Morland,  
formerly of the University of Oxford, who was  
accused of attempting to blackmail members of  
the nobility.

When Morland was arraigned he pleaded  
guilty to attempting to extort money from  
Baroness Russell.

for Morland is now 65 years of age.
