

Sudden Death of CHARLES A. BARNES, M.A.

Late School Inspector for East Lambton Died After Three Days' Illness.

(From Saturday's London Advertiser.)

Charles A. Barnes, M.A., late public school inspector for East Lambton, a member of the quarterly board of the First Methodist church, and a prominent South London citizen, was stricken with an affection of the heart while in the business section of the city on Tuesday afternoon, and died last evening at his residence, 27 Craig street.

Mr. Barnes' family had been aware of his affection for some time, but despite this, his death proved a serious shock. He was a remarkably active man, and on Tuesday walked up town. However, he suddenly became ill, and was removed to his home in a hack. His condition gradually grew worse, and Wednesday at noon lost consciousness. His son, Dr. E. C. Barnes, who is practicing in Guelph, was summoned home, and was with him at the time of his death.

BORN IN WARWICK.

Mr. Barnes was born 67 years ago in Warwick Township, in Lambton, about ten miles from the village of Watford. He was educated in public and high schools, and obtained both his B. A. and M. A. degrees at Albert College at Belleville.

Later he entered the teaching profession and held positions in public schools and Collegiate Institutes at Ottawa, Windsor, St. Mary's and other places. In 1877 he was appointed to the public school inspectorship for East Lambton, his home being at Forest at that time. Ten years later he removed to London, and has resided here almost continually since. While he directed his work from London for a great many years, he made his home in Petrolia for six years after 1902.

In 1905 he resigned from the inspectorship, and afterward returned to this city. Since that time he has lived retired, but has interested himself in realty here.

Mr. Barnes was an omnivorous reader, but had a particular liking for religious subjects. He also made a hobby of advanced mathematics. He was a member of different fraternal societies, including Kilwinning Lodge, A. F. & A. M., the Canadian Order of Foresters, the United Workmen, and Chosen Friends.
