Victoria, B. C., June 1.—Details were brought by the steamer "Kishinu Maru," which arrived yesterday afternoon, of warlike preparations in China to resist the Italian occupation of San Moon, and probably the further occupation of Shantung by Germany. A Pekin correspondent writes that Japan is dilligently and quietly making war preparations, as she did four years ago, and taking measures to strengthen her coast defences, feeling that a war with Russis in the near future is unavoidable. Russis is aware of Japan's intention to contest her in the East and fully recognizes the difficulty in which a war with Japan would place her, especially as the Japanese navy approaches that of her own in strength and additional ships are in course of construction in Europe. The annual report of the Montreal Board of Health for 1898 includes a special report which Dr. Laberge has had made on the last smallpox outbreak in Montreal, extending from July 3, 1897, to Feb. 12, 1898. There were 27 cases of smallpox in the city altogether, 14 of the patients dying and 13 being discharged cured.
