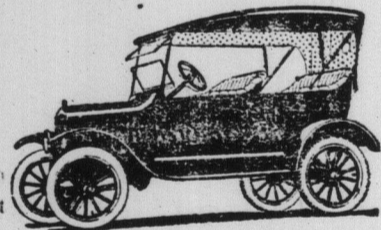

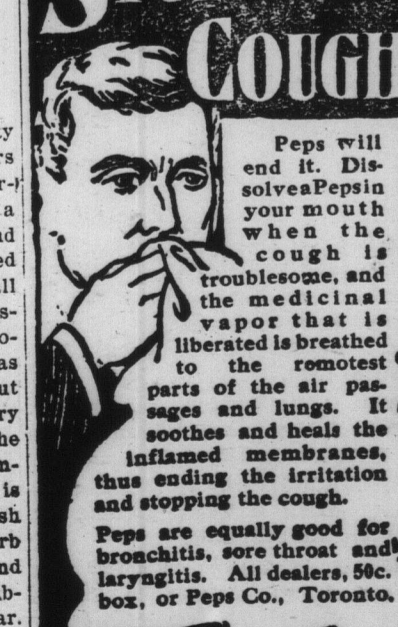

### RECEIPTS ON GRAIN EXCHANGE GREATEST IN CANADA'S HISTORY

Winnipeg.—History was made in the record movement of Western Canada's record crop. It is a record crop both as to quantity, quality and rapidity of movement. The receipts on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange are the greatest in the history of Western Canada. Total grain inspected was 2,824 cars, as compared with 1,295 cars last year. The inspections contained 2,482 cars of wheat, against 1,131 in 1921.

This year's crop is practically a number one grade crop, nearly nine-tenths per cent. of the inspection to date being contract grades. Of the 92,310 cars of wheat handled since September 1st, the opening of the present crop year, no fewer than 82,461 have been contract grades, the greatest volume being number one northern. Of the total cars inspected only 9.84 per cent. have been lower than number three northern.

### TRURO MAY GET POWER FROM SHEET HARBOR

Truro.—Engineers Johnson and Lumsden, of the Nova Scotia Water Power Commission, by request met members of Truro Town Council and Light Commission in a round table talk over hydro power for Truro from Sheet Harbor.

The engineers stated that cost to Pictou County from the Sheet Harbor source would be 1.70 per k. w. h. and for Truro, over a line from Stellarton, double that amount. The matter is now up to the local Light Commission to decide. The Truro cost is based on eight hundred thousand consumption.

### SMART RUN BY WEYMOUTH VESSEL

Yarmouth.—The Weymouth tern schooner Edith Belliveau, Capt. Henry Dianne, has arrived in Yarmouth from Boston after a passage of only twenty-two hours from Boston Light to Yarmouth Light. The vessel was in Yarmouth in August with a cargo of saws for Parker Eakins Co., Ltd., and since that time, with the exception of being laid up for four weeks, the schooner has been in the lumber trade between St. Mary Bay ports and Boston. Today the vessel commenced loading a cargo of lumber for Cienfuegos, Cuba, which will be supplied by Parker Eakins Co.
