Payette and John P. Gunning, as also those who assisted them, was adopted. A hearty vote of thanks was adopted to Mr. C A Mc-Danald, who had kindly given the free use of his rooms for the meeting of the committee. A vote of thanks was tendered to Bro. P. Reynolds for his many acts of courtesy to the committee.
