postero may be converted into face presentations, and delivery

effected in that way very easy.

In all cases when the diagnosis is made the accoucheur needs the benefit of all reading and experience to bring the labor to a happy conclusion with safety to the child and to the mother.

Dr. Wallace thought that his experience gave a larger average than usually quoted. He preferred to apply forceps

to the sides of pelvis.

Dr. Gillrie referred to the necessity of immediate attention

to the torn perineum.

Other members discussed the paper and congratulated the writer.

Corresponding secretary read a letter from Dr. Ross, of Toronto, in reply to an invitation from the society, offering to

read a paper at the next meeting of our society.

Drs. Wallace and McGillivray moved that the secretary write Dr. Ross thanking him for his offer, and accepting the same for our next meeting, and requesting him to discuss the subject of Gallstone Surgery.

Drs. Mullin and O'Reiley moved that the names of the writers and the papers read before this society be excluded

from the daily papers.

Paper for next meeting by Dr. Ross.

Meeting then adjourned.
