

THE FARM.

Bowls, during moulting, require more attention than during this time of drain upon the system.

There are few fowls in more prolific than game, and where there is a good variety of any kind no fowls will prove more prolific.

Penitry of all kinds should be well fattened on yellow corn, if possible, but should not be fed for at least twenty-four hours before killing, as a crop filled with food sores and turns black, injuring the appearance and sale very materially.

Now is the time to secure and begin to feed your fowls. Get the shells of the eggs as soon as they are laid, and keep them in a barrel. Break up in small pieces to fill a barrel.

Sheep love high ground, and in selecting a typical sheep farm or range this should be kept in mind. Rough hillsides, if they are entered with rich grasses, make the very best of pasture land for sheep, especially in wet seasons.

Considerable alarm is felt at the extent to which cholera is prevailing in Western Canada, and the government has given instructions to have the quarantine laws rigidly enforced.

The process employed by Mr. Harris, an American, in making Cheddar cheese, at the Highland and Agricultural Society's show at Aberdeen, Scotland, is thus described:—"In illustrating the Cheddar system, Mr. Harris took the morning's milk supplied by the Aberdeen Dairy Company, and after straining it up to 95 degrees he left it stand about two hours, till it cooled down to 86 degrees, when it was ripe enough to add the rennet.

On Wednesday the vat was filled with 90 gallons of milk, and to this three ounces of rennet were used. Twenty minutes after that he cut the curd—that is to say, in forty minutes after adding the rennet. Mr. Harris estimated one pound of cheese to one gallon of milk. One of the advantages of this system is that it enables a uniform quality of cheese to be produced.

It is well known to practical cheese makers on the Scotch Cheddar system that they never can guarantee an equal quality of cheese for two days in succession, in the case of the working at Aberdeen, where the first day's curd was too small to make a good sized cheese, and it had to be mixed with the second day's curd, the benefit accorded to uniformity acquired by Mr. Harris' method is very apparent.

THE HOME.

CHICKEN AND DUCKS. Prepare and roast a pair of chickens. Mean time boil one quart of potatoes for mashing and make twelve heart shaped croquettes, or pieces of bread fried in hot fat; lay the DUCKS around the chickens when it is dished and the croquettes in an outer circle, with the potatoes outward.

PRESSED CHICKEN ON YEAL. Put four pounds of veal or two chickens in a pot, cover with water, stew slowly until the meat drops from the bones, then take out and chop it. Lay the liquor hot down until there is a capful, put in a small cup of butter, a half-teaspoon of salt, a tablespoonful of pepper, a little allspice and a bean-egg; stir this through the meat. Slice a hard boiled egg, lay in your mould, and press in the meat. When put upon the table garnish with celery tops or parsley.

CHICKEN SALAD. Take some tender pullets, fry them in the sweeten or roast them. When cold cut them up, skinning and trimming them neatly. Put the pieces in a tureen with some acid, pepper, oil, vinegar, some sprigs of parsley and an onion cut into slices. Mix all well together, cover and let stand for some hours. Then, just before serving, drain the salad, taking care to remove all bits of onion, etc., and place it tastefully on lettuce leaves, with the hearts of the lettuce on top, and cover with a Mayonnaise Dressing.

SPRING CHICKEN FRIED. Put skillet on the stove with about one-half tablespoonful each of lard and butter, when hot lay in chicken, sprinkle over with flour, salt and pepper, place lid on skillet and cook over a moderate fire; when a light brown turn the chicken and sprinkle flour, salt and pepper over the top as at first; if necessary add more lard and butter and cook slowly until done, make gravy same as for baked chicken. As a general rule, half an hour is enough to fry spring chicken. To make rich and nice gravy without cream take the yolk of an egg, beat up light, strain and mix slowly into the gravy after the flour and milk have been stirred in and thoroughly cooked; as soon as it boils up the gravy is done and should be removed from the stove. All gravies need to be stirred well and thoroughly cooked over a moderate fire.

CHICKEN FONDUE. Some cold chicken, veal or turkey minced fine; one cupful bread crumbs, bakers' toast is best; one cupful boiling milk, one tablespoonful butter, one slice cold boiled ham, minced, one-half onion boiled in and then strained out of the milk, two eggs beaten very light, a pinch of soda dissolved in the milk, pepper and salt to taste. Soak the chicken in the boiling milk and beat very light. Let the mixture cool while you unice the meat and whip the eggs. Stir in the meat first when the bread is nearly cold, season, and lastly put in the beaten eggs. Beat all up well and pour into a well greased baking dish. Set in a brisk oven. When the fondue is a delicately browned pull, send at once to table in the dish in which it was baked.

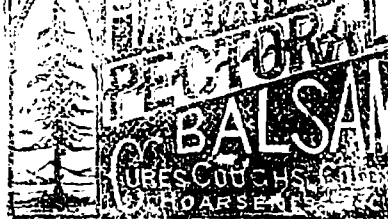
ATTACK ON DE FREYNET. Paris, Oct. 29.—Considerable excitement was caused to-day by an attempt to assassinate M. de Freynet, French minister of foreign affairs. After attending a Cabinet meeting M. de Freynet took a drive over the Pont Concord at noon, and while returning to the ministry of foreign affairs a man stopped out into the roadway and fired a pistol directly at his carriage. The shot was harmless, and before the culprit could fire again he was arrested. When the would-be assassin was examined at the police station he confessed he did not know de Freynet personally, and refused to give his name or occupation. The prisoner looks like a mechanic of superior intelligence, and appears to be of Italian origin. There is very little doubt that the assailant is an Italian, as he speaks with a strong Italian accent. He glories in his attempt on the life of the foreign minister and regrets that he failed to kill him. After being prevented from firing a second shot he threw the revolver into the River Seine. He is apparently of sound mind. M. de Freynet has suffered no ill consequences beyond a slight shock to his nervous system. He has received numerous congratulations on his escape, especially from foreign diplomats. The assailant is a Corsican. He declares that his motive was revenge and not of a political nature. He says he will make an explanation to-morrow. He claims the services of a lawyer. A doctor will examine into his mental condition. The culprit stated that M. de Freynet had injured him in reputation, honor and fortune. He said he knew M. de Freynet only by his photograph.

MORE AID FOR PARNELL. PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 29.—A mass meeting of Irish sympathizers in aid of the Irish Parliamentary fund was held here last night. Gov. Patterson presiding. A. M. Kieley was the principal speaker. A collection conveying the greetings of the assembled thousands and the intelligence that \$12,000 had been secured was sent to Parnell.

A LONG IMPRISONMENT.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28.—A judgment was heard to-day by Judge O'Brien of the Superior Court upon the question as to whether A. R. Macdonald, a subject of Great Britain, who has been nearly seven years in Ludlow street jail, should be released and allowed to defend the suit upon which he was incarcerated. Macdonald is 56 years of age and is a son of Captain John Macdonald, who, with 200 followers, attempted to escape from the prison in 1830, and thought he had a claim against the government for \$2,000,000 worth of cotton destroyed during the war.
