Considerable alarm is felt at the extent to which hog cholers is prevailing in Western Cataria, and the government has given in structions to have the quarantine laws rigidly saforces. The Minister of Agriculture states that the disease originated on the farm of a man whose property bordered on St. Clair Liver. Hogs raised on this farm had eaten the decomposed carcass of an animal which had been washed ashore, and to this cause the disease has been traced. Those which had partaken of the dead animal were taken ill and died, and after being thrown into the river drifted into a creek, where they sere eaten by hogs belonging to the neigh berhood, only to communicate the disase to other farms. Up to the present time the disease continues to spread. MAKING CHEDDAR CHEESE. The process employed by Mr. Harris, an mer can, in making Cheddar cheese, at the lighland and Agricultural Society's show at

berdeen, Scotland, is thus described :-"In illustrating the Cheddar system, Mr. Harris took the morning's milk supplied by the Aberdeen Dairy Company, and after warming it up to 95 degrees he let it stand shout two hours, till it cooled down to 86 derees, when it was ripe enough to add the renwenty minutes On Wednesday the vat was illed with 90 gallous of milk, and to this three ounces of rennet were used. Twenty sinutes efter that he cut the curd—that is to ay, in forty minutes after adding the rennet. Mr. Harris estimated one pound of cheese to one gallon of milk. One of the advantages of his system is that it enables a uniform quality of cheese to be produced. It is well known to practical cheese makers on the Scotch Cheddar sys

lem that they never can guarantee an equaquality of cheese for two days in succession. as in the cass of the working at Aberdeen, where the first day's curd was too small to take a good sized cheese, and it had to he nited with the second day's curd, the benefit accorded of uniformity acquired by Mr. Harris' method is very apparent. ATTACK ON DE FREYCINET.

PARIS. Oct. 29. - Considerable excitement was created to-day by an attempt to assassin ate M. de Freyeinet, French minister of foreign affairs. After attending a Cabinet meeting M de l'reyonnet took a drive over the Pont Concorde at noon, and while returning to the ministry of foreign affairs a mat stepped out into the readway and fired a pistol directly at his carriage. He has received numerous congratulations on his escape, especially from foreign diplomats. The assailant is a Corsican. He declares that his motive was revenge and not of a political nature. He says be will make an explanation to morrow. He claims the services of a lawyer. A doctor will examine into his mental condition. The culpris stated that M. de Freycinet had injured him in reputation. h nor and fortune. He said he knew M. de Freycinet only by his photograph.




