THE LATE MARNIE KIMELMAN

THE LATE MARNIE KIMELMAN

Mr. Jim Peterson (Willowdale): Mr. Speaker, on July 28, a home-made pipe-bomb exploded on a crowded Tel Aviv beach. It injured 18 people. It killed Marnie Kimelman, a 17-year old student at York Mills Collegiate in Toronto.

Marnie, who lived with her family in Willowdale, was part of a group of 80 Canadian teenagers touring Israel on a trip sponsored by the Canadian Zionist Federation. She was the fourth foreign visitor and the third Canadian to be killed by Palestinian terrorists.

As Canadians, there are no words that we can find to express our outrage at this vicious act of terrorism perpetrated against an innocent person. There are also no words that we can offer to Marnie's parents and her two brothers to ease the pain that they feel at her loss.

For our part, we must renew our pledge to fight against terrorism and re-affirm our commitment to do everything possible as Canadians to seek a lasting peace.
