OTTAWA, May 20 .- (Special.) - The nding March 31, 1914, tabled in the house today, appropriate \$23,470,816, of which \$17,328,809 is charged to consolidated revenue and \$6,141,506 to capimportant items of general interest include: An increase in the salary of the deputy minister of justice from \$7000 to \$10,000 and in the salary of chief commissioner of Dominion police from \$3600 to \$5000.
