





The market closed firm, 3-8 to 3-4 net higher with January 1.317-8 to 1.32 and May 1.30 3-8 to 1.30 7-8 Oats finished 1-8 off to 3-3 up, and provisions varying from 12 cents decline to a rise of 15 cents.

Altho the government report did not become public until after trading hours, the fact was well understood before hand that the revised figures from Washington in regard to corn production this season were likely to show a decided shrinkage as compared with preliminary estimates. The consequence was something of a bulge all around in prices, especially dur-ing the last fifteen minutes. Earlier in the day, free buying of January delivery for a leading elevator comwas a notable factor, but the bullish effect on the market as a






