

Paris, Dec. 25 .- Italian deputies of the redeemed provinces who represented their districts in Vienna and Budapest parliaments and came to Paris expressly for the purpose of submitting their case to the American mission, have been received by Colonel E. M. House. Thru Colonel House the deputies presented a memorial to President Wilson. The deputies are Pitacco for Trieste, Bennati for Istria, Zanelli for Fiume, and Ghigle Anovitch for Zara

for Zara. The memorial recites that their The memorial recites that their country has been for two thousand years Italian; that Trieste has suf-fered under Austrian oppression for five centuries, and Dalmatia since 1797 has stood all kinds of persecu-tions to defend its nationality. The people of the districts, says the me-morial, have fought in all wars for Italian independence and participated in the present war with 4,000 men. Regarding the annexation of Trentino, Trieste and Istria, the memorial says Trieste and Istria, the memorial says there is no question that can be raised, but adds that Flume being a free city, similar to Bremen and Lubeck, has the right to decide its own gov-ernment, and any contrary decision would be against the principles pro-claimed by President Wilson.
