Disposal of Legacies to Provincial Charitable Institutions.

A subscription of \$250,000 to the T. & N. O. Loan reduces the amount of bonds remaining to \$171,000. Hon. Mr. Matheson expects these to be taken up very shortly, completing the \$3,000,000.
