How British Engineers and Their Employers Keep Peace Tween Themselves.

A new agreement has lately been en tered into between the British engineering workmen and their employers, has been commended to The World as a model one. The unions involved are the Amalgamated Society of Engineers, the Steam Engine Makers' Society and the United Machine Workers' Association. This agreement is entered upon as a result of a "treaty' signed by the parties concerned at the clusion of the strike 1897-8.

It is doubtful if, in all our industrial affairs, a more comprehensive and fairminded document was ever evolved. Its principle is justice, and its essence is in trade union phraseology, "mutuality." It is the produ of mutual respect engendered in the long term of peace since one of the most severe industrial wars on record. Here, for instance, is the note as sounded in "The representative of the Engineer-

ing Employers' Federation on the one hand, and of the engineering trade unions on the other hand, being met in joint conference, and being convinced that the interests of each will be best served and the rights of each best maintained by a mutual agreement, hereby decide to adopt measures to avoid friction and stoppage of work. This, it will be observed, implies a permanent abolition of the militant ele-This was, in effect, the note of the 1898 agreement also, but that agreement has been associated in the minds of the men with the surrender of the vanquished, whereas the present agreement is between two powerful bodies fully equipped for both good and evil. The difference is material, and this is what lends a national and even a world-wide interest to the new treaty. It provides for the effective recognition
