

Doesn't Cure Cancer.

New York, Aug. 14.-A correspondent of the Times, cabling from London says: The discussion that has arisen in New York touching the value of the trypsin treatment for cancer prompted me to make inquiries at the London hospitals as to the results that had attended that treatment in this city. The replies to my inquiries may be summed up in the statement that the experiments with trypsin here have not demonstrated that it is a cure for cancer or useful in the treatment for the relief of cancer patients.

The London cancer hospital has discontinued the use of trypsin, its experts having failed to obtain any beneficial results from it, and having heard nothing from the experts of other institutions that runs counter to their experience and conclusions. In some hospitals the experiments are still proceeding but apparently without expectation that they will result otherwise than have the tests at the cancer hospital.


