FORCED IT ON LEADERS

Former Director of Krupps Exposes Devilish Plottings of German Emperor.

Gumligen. Switzerland, Wednesday, June 5.—Germany was wholly in agreement with Austria-Hungary concerning the ultimatum sent to Serbia at the outbreak of the war, says Dr. Wilhelm Muehlen, formerly director of Krupps, in further disclosures on the responsibility for the beginning of the conflict. Emperor William was personally responsible for Germany's participation and forced the German leaders to support his war policy.

Dr. Muehlon, who was head of Krupps at the outbreak of the war, and who recently startled Europe with his disclosures, received the correspondent of the Associated Press at his country place here, where he is now living in retirement. The visit came as Dr. Muehlon was preparing to issue a more detailed review of conditions leading to the war, and the correspond-

Ottawa, June 6.-It was announced by the Government today that the order-in-council restricting the import of luxuries and nonessentials was not intended to apply to green apples. In the statement given out earlier green apples were included in the list of restricted ar-ticles. It is not the intention to restrict the importation of this class of fruit. Ottawa, June 5.—Imports prohibited under the new embargo order recommended by the war trade board and passed yesterday by the Government, will total in value more than fifteen million dollars if the figures for the fiscal year 1917 are any criterion, and revenue lost on the same basis will approximate five million dollars. The new embargo order is not generally popular, the chief criticism being leveled against the embargo on automobiles over the value of \$1,200. Many big firms in Canada will, it is stated, be compelled to go out of business as a result of the order. During the fiscal year 1917 the total value of passenger automobiles brought into the Dominion was nearly eight million dollars. ACROSS OISE BUT QUICKLY SENT BACK BY GEN. FOCH

German Legions Fighting Desperately But Unable To Make Headway Against Firm Allied Ranks-German Raids On British Positions East of Amiens Futile --- Lloyd George Expresses Confidence As to the Outcome.

London, June 6.—The Germans last night repeated their attempt to raid the British positions in the Morlancourt region, east of Amiens, but were repulsed, the war office announced today.

The text of the statement says: "Last night the enemy again attempted to raid our positions southwest of Morlancourt and was repulsed with loss.

"Another hostile raiding party succeeded in rushing one of our posts yesterday afternoon in the neighborhood of Boyelles. Two of our men are missing."

DRIVEN BACK ACROSS OISE.

Paris, June 6.—German forces last night crossed the River Oise in the vicinity of Sampigny, but were driven back by the French, the war office announced today. North of the Aisne the French improved their positions in the neighborhood of Hautebraye. There was heavy artillery fighting in the neighborhood of Veuilly-la-Poterie.

LLOYD GEORGE CONFIDENT.

London, June 6.—Via Reuter's Limited.—Premier Lloyd George returned from the supreme war council in France full of confidence regarding the issue, Reuter's parliamentary correspondent says it is reported in the lobbies of parliament. While in France the premier saw Gen.

Foch, Premier Clemenceau and Baron Sonnino, the Italian foreign minister.

Paris, June 6.—The battle situation is frankly satisfactory, says a Havas Agency review today, and the enemy temporarily at least, is not likely to make attacks all along the front between Rheims and the Oise. Local attempts seem to indicate that the Germans have renounced for the moment their purpose to win a decision on the battlefleld picked out by their commanders on May 27.

Nevertheless, the newspapers do not believe that the German offensive is ended. The Petit Parisien thinks that Gen. Ludendorff is preparing a blow which he expects will have prodigious results.

ROUTED THE MACHINE GUNNERS. French Headquarters, June 6,-Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.-The more serious than appeared from first reports. The enemy threw ladder foot bridges across the river. Four were destroyed by gunfire.

The enemy losses in the machine gun battle with the Americans for Chateau Thiery bridge were also very heavy. Over a thousand German dead lay on the banks of the river and the streets leading thereto.
