TOKIO, Dec. 3.—The military commission at Chien Taa, Manchuria, has addressed a letter to the Canadian missionaries that massacres, alleged to have been committed by Japanese troops, had taken place, and that villages were burned. The letter emphasizes that the Japanese military expedition to the district was due to the fact that the Chinese authorities co-operated with the outlaws, and declares that churches and schools were burned only where there was incontestable evidence that they had been used as "breeding places of iniquity."


