NEW COLLIERIES TO BE OPENED IN THE CROW'S NEST DISTRICT

The property referred to has fallen into the hands of the Western Oil and Coal Consolidated, a concern that has been operating very largely in the oil field south of here They have acquired about 7000 acres of these coal lands and are now opening up the collieries to put them on a basis of one thousand or twelve hundred tons per day. 
