

### GOOD-BYE TO THE DIAGONAL ROADS

#### City Surveyor Drops One Proposed to Be Built Thru Todmorden.

Two subdivision plans—one in the city and the other in the township of York—to which the city had taken objection were passed by the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board yesterday, the city's objection being sustained in the one case and overruled in the other. The piece in the township was a block of about forty acres of the Robert Davies estate, adjoining the north limit of the city, and lying between the Don road and the Eglinton road. The city insisted that this subdivision plan should provide for the extension of Carlaw avenue northward, and that this district was like a wedge in an industrial area, in which case there would be no necessity to extend Carlaw avenue. York township had accepted the plan.

The township is probably not as alive to the needs of urban areas as the city, said Chairman McIntyre. It developed that the block from Pape avenue to Logan would be over 1100 feet.

Mr. Ballantyne said the city had refused to take in this piece of property or supply sewer or water connection, and he did not think it was quite just that the city should block their plan when the township had approved it.

The board ruled that the plan would have to show both Carlaw and Logan avenues thru the property.

Some time ago the city laid out a diagonal road thru this property, starting at Fulton, near the city limits, and running northeasterly in the general direction of the northward turn of the city recently have shown this diagonal road, including Mr. LeMay's official maps, also the maps put out by the city transportation commission and the Hydro ones. The plans of the Robert Davies estate, however, do not show this road, and the city surveyor, Mr. LeMay, who was present, said that it had not been represented when this case was heard. Where have all the diagonals of Mr. LeMay gone?

By this plan, Westwood and Floyd avenues are extended eastward to Pape, as well as two new streets between Westwood and the city limits, Carlaw, Logan and Christie are extended northward to the first lot south of Gowan avenue, and Jackson and Arundel avenues are extended northward to the second new cross street.

John A. Phipps, who is in charge of subdivision plan of about 20 acres lying along the south side of Danforth avenue, a short distance east of the city limit, and north of the city, the city asked that approval be conditional upon the applicant signing an agreement to grade the streets thru the property and exempt the city from liability in connection with the establishing of building levels in the future. Chairman McIntyre, thru the city, was not so exacting, and declined to make such a ruling. The applicant stated that the city could exact its pound of flesh by refusing to assume the streets to be graded.

Mr. Colquhoun, assistant city solicitor, said these streets might become a liability on the city. Even if developed as a local improvement, a large percentage of the cost would fall on the city at large.

Streets have been laid out thru the property to conform to the established streets.

#### SET PICNIC DATE.

Women's Legion, No. 54, of Moose Lodge, West Toronto, held their meeting last night in the Dundas street club rooms. #### British Pressmen Expected On Canadian Soil Today

Sydney, N.S., July 26.—Empire delegates to the second imperial press conference will set foot on Canadian soil tomorrow when they disembark from the steamship Victorian at Sydney. About a hundred delegates and ladies of the party are on board the ship which, delayed by fog, is now scheduled to east anchor off Sydney at nine o'clock Tuesday morning, a few hours late. The party will leave here on schedule, however, about seven p.m. and is due in Halifax early Wednesday morning.

#### STRATFORD GIRL ASSAULTED.

Stratford, Ont., July 26.—The police are actively investigating a serious case of assault on a young girl, who was found late Saturday night in an unconscious condition near the waterworks on Romeo street. After being found, the girl, who is said to be a domestic, was taken to the police station and later to her home.

It is reported that she was met by a young man on Saturday night and taken out to the waterworks, where she was drugged and assaulted.

### CANADIAN NATIONAL TO EFFECT A SETTLEMENT

#### Negotiations With 12,000 Employees Are Progressing Well.

Winnipeg, July 26.—Prospects for an early settlement of the negotiations between the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees look bright, declared H. F. Lawrence, general chairman of the western lines grievance committee today. Mr. Lawrence, H. Minchin, Calgary, R. Dyer, Saskatoon, and other members of the committee, arrived here Saturday from the east.

They are back here to conclude negotiations with A. B. Warren, general manager of the Canadian National Railways, western lines. As Mr. Warren is out of the city it is expected that ten days will elapse before any further meetings are held. More than 12,000 employees are affected by the new schedule.

### CHEAP HEATING BY ELECTRICITY

#### Manitoba University Professor Claims to Have Discovered New Principles.

Winnipeg, July 26.—The scheme of Prof. J. W. Dorsey, of Manitoba University, for electrically heating houses, by which he claims, expenses could be cut down to 50 cents a month, is to be considered by J. G. Glasco, manager of the city light and power department, and P. A. Cambridge, city electrician. Use of the invention by Prof. Dorsey was offered the city.

In a few days Prof. Dorsey will leave for Washington, where he has been called to consult with the United States Bureau of Standards about the application of the new principles he has discovered.

Interviewed today, Prof. Dorsey said that power could be developed from the Winnipeg River sufficient to heat the people of Winnipeg in the most extreme winter. New development in the transmission of electricity would reduce by one-half the cost of transmission, he said.

### TEN MIRACLES SO FAR REPORTED

#### Ten Thousand People Attend Gathering at St. Anne de Beaupre.

Quebec, July 26.—Ten thousand people from all parts of Canada and the United States gathered at the little hamlet of St. Anne de Beaupre Sunday and today to take part in the honoring of the feast of St. Anne at the famous shrine.

Up to this evening ten miracles had been reported, but the Redemptorist fathers in charge of the shrine refused to make any official statement explaining that they could not record any cure until they had fully investigated the case.

Among the cures reported today three names were given: Mary E. Hickey of Walpole, Mass., 23 years, suffering from a disease of the spine which necessitated the use of crutches; she is said to have been completely cured as she received holy communion. Another name reported was Bernard Vallieres of St. Henri, Lewis County, Quebec, and Adolphe Froid of Haverhill, Mass.

The celebration of low masses was started at four o'clock this morning. One hundred and twenty masses were celebrated, and holy communion was distributed to seven thousand persons.

Mr. O'Reilly of Lincoln, Nebraska, was the celebrant at the pontifical mass this morning, while Mr. LeMay, of Bourbonnais, Ill., carried the ciborium in the procession this afternoon, and officiated at benediction.

### BRITISH GOLF STARS BEAT U. S. CHAMPIONS

New London, Conn., July 26.—Harry Vardon and Edward Ray, British golf stars, defeated Walter Hagen, open champion, and James Barger, United States professional champion, one up in a thirty-six hole match on the Sheneconet Country Club links here today. A putt of more than thirty feet by Vardon on the last green won the match.

### Thousands Are Homeless Thru Typhoon in Luzon

Manila, July 26.—Thousands were rendered homeless by a typhoon which swept the island of Luzon during the past ten days or two weeks, causing tremendous damage.

A dyke of the Tulaik river, central Luzon, was broken, flooding thousands of acres of rice and sugar lands and carrying off hundreds of small houses. Loss of life was reported small.

### ULTIMATUM TO SOVIET.

Warsaw, July 26.—The Lithuanian government has delivered an ultimatum to the Soviet government demanding the immediate evacuation of Lithuanian territory by red troops.

### LOOK FOR HUSBAND MURDERED WOMAN

#### Police in Every City in U.S. Asked for Aid to Solve Trunk Mystery.

Detroit, Mich., July 26.—Search for Eugene Leroy, whose wife's mutilated body was found jammed in a trunk shipped from Detroit to New York, assumed general proportions today.

Police in every large city of the United States were asked to aid in the search after Patrolman Leo Turnbull of the Detroit police department had failed to identify a man giving the name of Roy Miller and held by Chicago authorities pending investigation as Leroy.

### CAPITAL OF CHILE ROCKED BY EARTHQUAKE

Santiago, Chile, July 26.—The city was rocked by a strong earthquake at 12.30 o'clock this morning. The disturbance was felt thruout the central zone of the country from Serena to Concepcion. Aftershocks from Argentina caused an earthquake occurred at Mendoza last night, lasting nearly two minutes.

### SASKATCHEWAN TO HAVE FAIR YIELD

#### Little Damage From Hail Crop Failure in Extreme Southwest.

Regina, July 26.—The rains of last week reflect an optimistic note in the Saskatchewan government crop report for the week ending Saturday. The process of scorching has been arrested, and while damage done by hot sun and drought cannot be repaired, the indications are that in many districts fair yields will be realized. In the Assiniboia district, a yield of fifteen bushels of wheat is estimated. The drought is stated to have caused at least fifty per cent loss of the straw with lighter damage in Cupar, Lipton, Fort Qu'Appelle, Indian Head, and other districts. In the Vonda district the rains saved about half the crop.

### REGINA BARBERS AGAIN SAYING 'YOU'RE NEXT'

Regina, July 26.—After a strike lasting exactly fourteen days, Regina journeymen barbers returned to work today. The new agreement grants concessions both ways. The men wanted a minimum of \$25 a week, and 60 per cent over \$35 taken by their chairs. What they get is a minimum of \$25 a week, with 65 per cent, straight over \$38.50 taken by their chairs.

### U. S. WAGE INCREASE TO APPLY TO G.T.R.

#### Pay Will Be Uniform With That on U. S. Lines of the System.

Ottawa, July 26.—The Journal tomorrow will publish the following: The schedule of wage increases granted to United States railwaymen will be applied to the Grand Trunk system thruout Canada within the next two weeks. According to information from high officials of the company given to representatives of the men's brotherhood following the announcement of the awards by the United States labor board in Chicago last week.

### REACHED AGE OF 109.

Ottawa, July 26.—Edward Huca-bone died last week at the residence of his son, Robert, near Rankin, Renfrew county, at the age of 109 years. It is claimed by his children that he was the oldest man in Canada, and had lived under six British sovereigns—from George III to George V. He was born on the banks of the Ottawa river, not far from this city.

### ACCEPT COMPANY'S TERMS

Owen Sound, Ont., July 26.—Machinists employed at the Northern Bolt and Screw Company's plant, who have been on strike for ten weeks, today returned to work on the company's terms of ten per cent increase for skilled men and almost as much for unskilled workers.

### ONE DEAD, ONE INJURED; RESULT OF BARN RAISING

Belleville, Ont., July 26.—(Special).—At a barn-raising on the farm of Robert Jackson, Paudash road, North Hastings, a fatal accident occurred. While a heavy piece of timber was being raised to its position, a chain broke, allowing the timber to fall. It struck Peter W. Laundry and Duncan McEellan. The former was almost instantly killed, and McEellan had two ribs broken and was otherwise seriously injured. Others had a narrow escape.

### MORE EARTH TREMORS SHAKE LOS ANGELES

Los Angeles, Cal., July 26.—A sharp earthquake shook awake Los Angeles at 4:12 this morning. A few chimneys were knocked down, dishes broken and windows rattled. A second and much lighter shock was felt at 4:55 a.m.

### MACARONI DISTRIBUTION CAUSES RIOTS IN ITALY

Rome, July 26.—Seven persons were killed and several wounded today at Randazzo, a small town in the province of Catania, when five hundred peasants forced their way into the municipal offices because of dissatisfaction with the distribution of macaroni. The deaths occurred when the rioting was suppressed by the authorities.

### POPE ANNULS MARRIAGE.

Quebec, July 26.—(By Canadian Press).—His Holiness Pope Benedict has annulled recently the marriage of Oscar Drouin, a lawyer of this city, to Miss Genevieve Lamoureux of Montreal. The wedding was celebrated about a couple of years ago.

### ALLIED MISSIONS ARRIVE IN WARSAW

#### Greeted by Vast Crowds Who Express Great Hope of Deliberations.

Warsaw, July 26.—Nineteen members of the special British and French missions sent here to look into Poland's military situation and to confer with the government authorities, arrived in Warsaw yesterday and spent the day in making official calls and holding conferences.

The missions, which are headed by Lord D'Abernon, British ambassador to Germany and Jean Jules Jusserand, French ambassador to the United States, who is in Europe on leave of absence, were met by representatives of the Polish government. Vast crowds who had been reading the newspaper accounts of the allied negotiations in Poland's behalf, assembled and showed their entertained great hopes on the outcome of the deliberations of the missions.

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### ALL IRISH WORKERS WILL BE PROTECTED

#### Chief Secretary for Ireland Says There Will Be No Discrimination.

London, July 26.—In the house of commons tonight Joseph Devlin, Nationalist member for West Belfast, moved the adjournment to call the attention to the riots in Belfast, and the alleged failure of the government to afford adequate protection to Roman Catholics, asserting that the army of occupation in Ireland should maintain order impartially.

James Sexton, seconding the adjournment, stated that unless the horrible business ended the quickly, he and his friends would no longer take the responsibility of keeping peace in the ranks of labor on the other side of the channel.

Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, in reply repudiated the charge of partiality. All workers would be afforded the protection to the fullest extent irrespective of creed, he said.

Reports that the government was opening negotiations with representatives of the Sinn Fein for the purpose of reaching a compromise for the future of Ireland were set at rest in the house by the premier. Lloyd George stated in the house today that the government was opening negotiations or parleys with any section of Ireland, and answered the negative.

The British government has no intention of withdrawing the government of Ireland bill, Premier Lloyd George stated in the house today. It would press the measure forward with all possible speed when the house re-assembled after the holiday recess he added.

### IRISH PAPER DEMANDS ONE IRISH PARLIAMENT

Dublin, July 26.—The Freeman's Journal prints an article today replying to the statement made by Mr. Lloyd George last Thursday in a denunciation of the parliamentary committee of the Trades Union Congress, in which the premier declared he was as anxious as any man to see the Irish question settled on a basis acceptable to the majority of the Irish people and that the government was prepared to go a long way in letting Ireland manage her own affairs if the necessary assurances were forthcoming.
