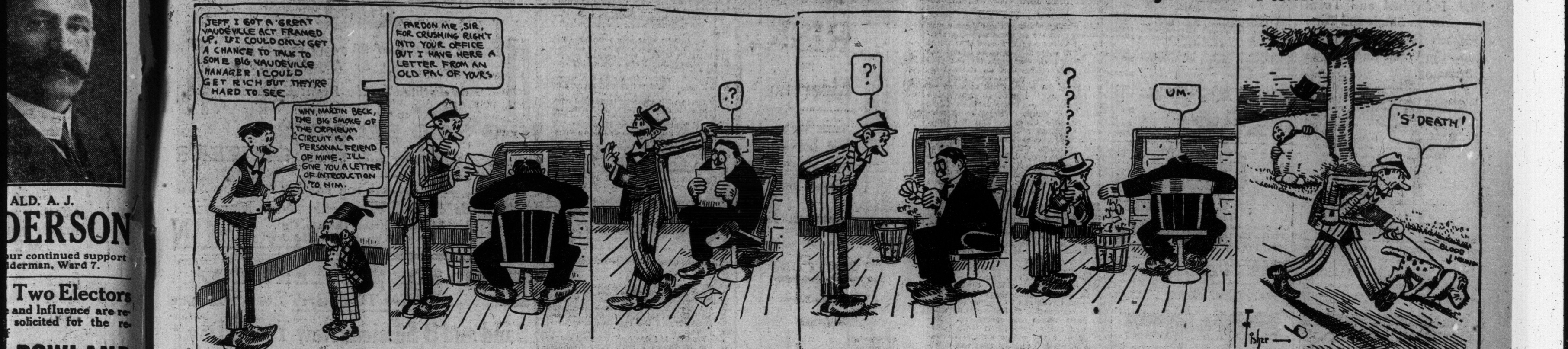

Margot Leonard Wins 2.23
Trot in Straight Heats

Unfinished 2.29 Class Goes Finally to Lew Jean, Who Took Third, Fifth and Sixth Heats.

DUFFERIN PARK, Dec. 31.—The third day of the Toronto Driving Club's winter meet was held yesterday under the most favorable weather and track conditions. There were three races on the program—the unfinished 2.29 pace, the 2.13 pace (with nine entries and eight starters), and the 2.23 trot (with seven entries and five starters). The attendance was hardly up to the average of the meeting, but still was good. Promptly at 1.30 the first heat of the unfinished 2.29 pace was called, but it was nearly two o'clock when Starter Baker gave the word. After very few seconds they were away to a good break. Lew Jean, the black mare in Jimmie Powell's string, was soon in front, and maintained that position to the finish, winning the race in second and third place. Time of mile, 2.20.

For the second heat of the unfinished 2.29 pace only three horses started—Lew Jean, Jennie Hal and Dan Fisher. At the first start they all came together, and Lew Jean led all the way and finished full of race, with Jennie Hal second and Fisher third. Time of mile, 2.23. Thus Lew Jean won the race, Jennie Hal second, Dan Fisher third.

In the first heat of the 2.13 pace, Jim Fisher, the pole, with Hal Direct second and Ideal third. There was very little scoring, and they got away to a splendid break, but before the finish was reached Ideal took command, and it was a good race, with Hal Direct, Ideal and Adeyde. When going the second half, Russ McGirr's Jennie Price came very strong from behind and gave Ideal a good send-off for first place, while Adeyde got the show money. Time of mile, 2.20.

The second heat of the 2.13 pace was not as fast as the first one, but it was a good race. After a couple of scores they were sent away, Ideal having a good send-off. Jim Fisher made a bid for it and raced to the half, with Ideal, while Jennie Price, chm., W. R. McGirr, Owen Sound (McGirr) 2.1 1.1 dis.

The third heat of the 2.13 pace was somewhat of a struggle, and Jim Fisher had the lead before reaching the quarter pole, with Sunday Belle second. They raced this way to the five-eighths pole, when the favorite, Jennie Price, moved up, and when she reached the half she took command, and it was a nice finish, with Sunday Belle and Jim Fisher for second place. Time of mile, 2.23.

In the fourth heat of the 2.13 pace, something unusual happened, when Russ McGirr, the driver of Jennie Price, who she won the heat, was disqualified, and sent to the barn for weighing in light. The heat was given to Adeyde, with Ideal second and Berlin Belle third.

Before the start of the fifth heat in the driver of Jennie Price was fined \$5 for attempted fraud in the fourth heat. After several scores they were away to a good start. Ideal led all the way till within fifty yards of the wire when Adeyde, who was working his way out, came on and nipped Ideal at the wire. Time of mile, 2.25.

The result of the sixth heat was very unsatisfactory on account of the time. The race was called at 2.23, but the judges decided to call it no heat and postponed the race till Monday.

In the first heat of the 2.23 trot Sir John drew the pole, Mary Isabel second and the favorite, Margot Leonard, third. After so a delay they were given the word and before the eighth pole was reached the favorite had the pole and won as she pleased, winning in 2.20 1/2.

The second heat of the 2.23 trot was just a repetition of the first, with the exception that Reynolds did away better, but went in a bad luck on the first turn and Margot Leonard and Sir John were finished that way, with Reynolds third and Lady Brown fourth. Time 2.27.

The final heat of the 2.23 trot was won by Margot Leonard in easy fashion, with Lady Brown second and Sir John third. Time 2.24.

Leafs' Utility Infielder Leads League at Second Base in Fielding.

WON BIG AVIATION PRIZE
Englishman Gets \$20,000 for Flight Across Channel.

ALDRERSHOT, Eng., Dec. 31.—Capt. Frank Cody, head of the ballooning department of the British war office, today won the British Michelin Cup for duration and distance for 1910 by flying 190 miles in four hours and fifty minutes. The flight ended when Cody's aeroplane accidentally touched the ground. The British Michelin Cup is valued at \$20,000, and a cash prize of the same amount goes with it.

The Baron de Forest prize of \$20,000 for the longest flight across the English Channel in 1910 by an Englishman in an English-built machine goes to T. Sopwith.
