### BRITAIN BEING CHOKED TO DEATH ONE GERMAN VIEW

Tagliche Rundschau Has Account of Our Terrible Plight Worthy of Constantinople

London, March 19.—Public opinion in Germany says the Daily Chronicle has absolutely decided that the "blockade" of British harbors is ineffective. "Although some weeks have gone since February 18th," says the Chronicle, "and although the results of the new maritime frightfulness have been so insignificant, the conviction has not weakened that 'invincible Albion' is shown of her bulwarks and that Germany's 'ring of steel' (submarine) is gradually but surely robbing us of our naval supremacy. An article on this subject appears in the Tagliche Rundschau descriptive of the dire conditions existing in this country. Our troubles, it seems, began in November with the appearance in our midst of German bombs. Since then life in England has not been worth living. "When German ships appeared on Al-

tion's coasts our national feeling became still more depressed, and we knew that it was no longer German bluff but German seriousness. And then in rapid succession, says the Rundschau, came German warships and submarines, ships and aeroplanes in 'beautiful rings,' and the populace was shaken out of its lethargy, the old bragging and boasting ceased and a terror fell upon us. "But more terrible followed. At Heligoland our fleet suffered serious injuries and then came the most awful blow of all—the rush of German submarines to our shores. With giant steps they encircled the British shores. Ships bearing food and drink to England were sent to the bottom of the sea, and the 'iron grapple' was forged around the inviolable island. It will crush her until her breath is choked out of her," says the Rundschau. "In Dithyrambes a writer describes the ineffectiveness in action of the British fleet, condemned to idleness by the superiority of German fleet (spirit), and heroism."

### SAYS HEARST HAS REACHED AGE OF NEUTRALITY

Echo de Paris Takes Fling at America's Millionaire Newspaper Publisher

Paris, March 19.—The Echo de Paris publishes the following editorial entitled "Business." "Here's a story of neutrality which is an American story. Its hero is Monsieur Hearst, a citizen of the United States, millionaire, and editor of several newspapers. Both positions ought to satisfy anyone nowadays when millions are generally lacking and American newspapers doing good business, but M. Hearst, who combines both, has not lost the edge of his financial appetite on that account. No opportunity for making money leaves him indifferent. Everything indicates that he regards this war from a purely commercial standpoint. He owns, in fact, four great publications, the New York American, Deutsches Journal, Harper's Bazaar, and the Cosmopolitan Magazine. The latter is represented in England by Nash's Magazine.

"At the outbreak of war Hearst, the millionaire, decided it was indispensable to take sides in the conflict devastating Europe, a colorless paper being certain to lose readers. He accordingly adopted the following attitude: two of his papers became remarkably Germanophile, while two others eloquently supported the Allies. Thus Americans can find at London in Nash's, under the title 'German atrocities in Belgium,' a photograph they saw at New York in the Cosmopolitan differently entitled 'Massacre effected by the Allies.' "Indeed, Hearst lacks neither ingenuity nor business sense, but he overdoes it on August 4 when he prints in the Deutsches Journal that the French attacked Germany before the declaration of war, while the same newspaper on the 14th, 16th and 16th of September described imaginary atrocities committed by the French and Belgians; when it affirms on the 11th of December that cruel treatment by the English caused the death of forty German prisoners, or publishes on the 29th of December the text of a secret convention between the English and Belgians.

"But that does not matter to Hearst, he sells papers as one sells copper. He has all sorts for all castes. It is the same of neutrality."

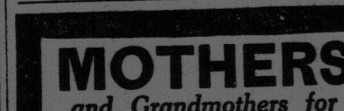
