WAR NOT YET BIT ANnullMENT OF TREATY WITH AUSTRIA IS ANNOUNCED BY ITALY

Official Statement of Negotiations Which Have Been Carried on

Rome, May 20—Diplomatic documents which disclose the negotiations which resulted in Italy's denunciation of her treaty of alliance with Austria and Germany are contained in a green book issued by the Italian government.

THE LEAST THAT ITALY WOULD TAKE

Rome, May 20—The minimum demands made upon Austria on behalf of Italy by Foreign Minister Sonnino, were: First—The cessation of the entire province of Trent (part of the Austrian Tyrol), according to the frontier of the kingdom of Italy in 1811.
